Of these Schools, ten have furnished statistical returns, of which the following is a summary, viz.: 216 teachers; 1881 scholars; having libraries containing 6360 books. If we take the above figures as an average, we may assume that there are belonging to the Schools connected with the Union, 345 teachers, 3008 scholars, and 8576 books.

The news from England relative to Confederation is of the most satisfactory character. The modifications in the Scheme give great additional advantages to the Maritime Provinces, and are sufficient to remove all objections to the Union from the minds of those opposed on account of New Brunswick not being sufficiently provided for in our representation in the Council, and also too little for local purposes. We subjoin from the Journal and Telegraph statements which we believe are reliable, relative to the changes alluded to. By recent telegrams we learn that the Bill has been read the first and second time in the Commons, and as we believe it is the custom in England to discuss all Bills on the second reading, it may therefore be concluded that the Bill authorising the Confederation of these Provinces has virtually passed, and Colonial Union is a fixed fact ! According to these, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will have in the Legislative Council twelve members each, instead of ten, as provided in the Quebec Resolutions. An interesting race between two American ships, both of which are owned in Belfast, Maine, has attracted considerable interest in Europe and America. he race was from Callao to Algesiras. How Tobacco is Consumed in Europe. - In the ci The Corresponding Secretary, Mr. Win. Wood- ty of Hamburg, Germany, the manufacture of tobacincluding its own production, of 168,000,000 cigars, 153,000,000 of which are exported, leaving 15,000,000 for home consumption-allowing 40,000 cigars a day to an adult male population of 45,000. In England, with a population of 21,000,000, in 1821, the con-

sumption of tobacco was 15,598,152 pounds, an average of 12 ounces per herd for the entire population; in 1831, with a population of 24,410,489, the consumption reached 19,523,841 pounds, or 13 ounces per head; in 1841, population 27,019,672, consumption, 22,309,360 pounds or 131 ounces per head; and in 1851, population 27,452,682, the consumption was 28,062 841 pounds, or 17 ounces of tobacco per head, showing a steady increase. In France the consumption of tobacco is 181 ounces per head, nearly half of which is snuffed. In Denmark, in 1848, it was 70 ounces per head; and in Belgium it averages about 34 ounces per head.
