We would that all our representatives were equally full on the question of taxation for schools.

THE QUESTION OF EDUCATION-A PLEA FOR FREE SCHOOLS. There is a matter left entirely in the hand of our Local Legislature which, when considered in all its bearings upon the welfare of any people, I am disposed to regard as nearly the most important, and that subject is Education. I am not prepared at this moment to submit for your consideration the details of any measure for helping us in this respect, but, I may tell you that I believe the money now spent upon Education in this Province might be employed to better advantage, and I am opposed to the school sys-

tem which now obtains amongst us. I believe the schools of our country should be numerous and free, so that the child of the laborer might have the same advantages for a common education as the child of the merchant, that the road to preferment and honor, by giving every son and daughter of New Brunswick the chance of a free education, should be open to all. As matters are now the child of the poor man cannot say with truth, "There is no royal road to learning." To him the road is royal and forbidden him to tread on account of his poverty. This must not longer remain. Mind must triumph over matter, and New Brunswick must not perpetuate a system which really condemns to slavery the intellects of her poorer sons, raises no hope nor aspiration in their hearts that as the generations come the descendants of him whose only heirloom is labor, shall be able by the application of a cultivated mind to climb to a better condition, or work his way from poverty to plenty, and from obscurity to renown. (Loud cheers.) I would have every school free, and I would exercise compulsion to get every child to school. The money for this should be raised upon imports, and thus the capital of the country would in the first instance furnish the funds to educate the rising generation, but every man would pay alike and none would feel it. I would of course tax luxuries more than necessaries, and by raising funds for our schools in this way, we would distribute the burthen far more equitably than by direct taxation. The transient mechanic and laborer coming among us during a few months of extra wages when times are very good, and shift-

ing again when wages are depressed to other places where there is more demand for his skill, would share the cost of schooling our children as he ought. If we afford him a chance to accumulate money and give him a living and labor, it is right and just that he should pay towards educating our children; but we can not get at him any other way than by levying a tax upon what he drinks, chews and wears. Pursuing such a course we would soon raise our country from the slough of despond in which it has so long struggled, and thirty years hence would find


