CONFEDERATION BILL -The Journal of Monday, in Scotia, and New Brunswick, says:

It is, as might have been expected, more mature and equitable in its provisions than the Quebec Scheme, nor does it contain, so far as we have been able to discover, any serious drawbacks. The dangerous sectarian provisions alleged to have been engrafted on the Bill do not appear on the surface of Section 91; but this, for the present, is all the reference we can make to the subject matter of that sec-

It will be seen that the Dominion of Canada is to embrace the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, (but other provinces may be hereafter admitted) and to be under the Government of one Parliament, consisting of the Queen, the Senate and the House of Commons. The Union will be deemed consummated so soon as it has been published by Royal Proclamation.

The supreme Executive power shall be in the Queen, who will be represented by a Governor General, who is to nominate a Privy Council under the Great Seal of Canada.

The Legislative power shall be in a Senate and House of Commons, the former consisting of 72 members, 24 from Ontario, 23 from Quebec, and 24 from the Maritime Provinces. Should Prince Edward Island join the Dominion, there would then be more than 24 members in the Senate from the Maritime wick, they will not again be filled up. The property qualification of a Senator in freehold is \$4,000 overhold his seat for life, subject to certain conditions.

The Speaker of the Senate shall be appointed by the Crown, which may, also, in given cases, and six members to that body, but in the same proportions as are now observed in forming it.
