Self-government is well nigh impossible to be learned by those whose parents have not in the first instance governed them, and made self-control into a habit by authority.

A remembrance comes to the writer of a son once born to a young father and mother, and so selfishly loved by them as to be indulged to the uttermost. Never was a wish denied, or a petty wilfulness restrained; and, of course, he grew up into "un garcon terrible," totally unmanageable by his parents, or indeed by anybody else. Schools could do nothing with him; he announced his intention of idleness and amusement, no matter to what profession be was made pupil; and he came home on the verge of manhood to be literally the sorrow of his parents' lives. Every passion was indulged now to the full-in fact, he was unable to deny himself anything which promised enjoyment. Before he was twenty-five years old he had become a confirmed drunkard. And when he died, shortly afterwards, a gentleman who knew the family intimately exclaimed, "That miserable death lies at the door of the parents who indulged him so sinfully."

Now, why had they indulged him? Because it was only another form of indulging themselves. This is always the case where children are spoiled ; the system is a mere outflow of personal selfishness. "There' is nothing more tempting to a woman's tenderness than a little child of two years old; it is tempting even to those who are not mothers. The soft round cheek, the bright complexion, the silky hair, are so inviting to the eye, the broken words are so sweet to the ear, the tottering steps appeal so trustingly for help, and the first demonstrations of awakening love are so inexpressibly winning, that it requires a selfcontrol greatly beyond that to which we have at all accustomed ourselves, to look grave or check, much more to punish." 


