



Should I be honored by a majority of your votes, I would not support any measure adverse to the Union, unless the constituency, after convincing proof of the inefficiency of its working, should desire an improvement in the federation by Constitutional means; this, the people must hereafter decide. In the meantime, I would endeavour to co-operate with those who desire to benefit the County by taking advantage of the means offered by the establishment of the New Dominion, to promote the progress and prosperity of this Province.

In my previous political career (though short) I think I have not forfeited my claim to consistency and independence of action, and trust, should ' be elected, to retain that confidence which I flatter myself my friends have heretofore reposed in me.
