"The population of London has of late years rapidly and immensely increased, while the dwelling accommodation, owing to the construction of railways and other public works, has, to a large extent, and with still greater rapidity, diminished. The results are the crowding of large numbers of persons into single apartments in tenements and localities of the very worst description, without distinction of family age, or sex. The physical and moral deterioration thus produced is excessive, degrading, and alarming, throwing numbers on the poor-rates, consigning many to hospitals and infirmaries, and more to lives of sin, and shame, and ruin. . . . There are at present living in London about half a milion of workmen and poor persons and their families, for whom no adequate and proper house shelter is provided, and 50,000 of this number have been dispossessed of their homes within the last four years, and forced into districts already teeming with life and disease."-
