Another train would have to be dispatched for the passengers from Shediac.

The Marsh Road, especially that portion between the Cemetery and the Three Mile House, was overflown yesterday in some places to the depth of two feet. Of course the adjoining fields were also laid under water. The ice which formed on this after the frost set in has rendered the road totally impassable to teams, the ice cutting up the horses' feet. All who went from town this morning were compelled to return, and those coming inwards-countrymen, milkmen, &c. - had to leave their horses on the other side, haul their sleds through by hand, and hire horses here to bring their loads into town. The water is fast subsiding, however.

THE SUPPRESSION OF GAMBLING. - Prominent among the abominations which disgrace this city, says a New York paper, depraying its youth, and leading to ruin great numbers of strangers who come here upon business or pleasure, are the dens of gamblers which invest it. No laws hitherto enacted have proved powerful enough to repress this evil, and those which have been passed to check it have not been enforced with sufficient vigor to prevent the increase of these pregnant sources of crime and shame. We are glad to learn that a petition is in circulation calling upon the Legislature to make a law compelling every member of the Metropolitan Police forthwith to report to his commanding officer the situation of every faro-bank, lottery or policy shop, or other gambling hell on his beat; to compel the captains forthwith to report to headquarters; to compel instant descent upon the house so reported ; to require the seizure of the gambling tools and persons employed in gambling; to make it absolute forfeiture of his place for any policeman to neglect such duty ; to make the keeping and maintenance of a gambling place, after notification to the policeman, cause for his dismissal, and compel the Metropolitan Police Department to stamp out these places. > Austria. - The state of public feeling throughout Austrian empire continues to be very bad. So supreme a case of moral anarchy is happily seldom seen in these times. The collection of countries that make up the Austrian empire are all occupied with their respective rights and privileges, and seem all determined to insist upon those rights without the slightest regard to the general interest. Each of the countries is entitled to its own laws, different from those that regulate the other countries of the empire. The poor Emperor explains that it is impossible to govern a State which is divided into sections, each with its separate legal system. The nationalists don't care. The other nationalists may give up their ancient privileges if they choose; but as for their country it is impossible. And as no one of the nationalities is strong enough to subjugate all the others, as the Germans were in the palmy days of the Austrian empire, there seems to be no possible way out of this strange confusion.
