

A WORKINGMEN'S PARLIAMENT, or conference of 100 Trades' Unions (says a London Letter), comprising 500,000 members, has been sitting since Wednesday in St. Martin's Hall. Its object is to consider the position of those bodies, and the proposed Commission of loquiry, which has excited great attention. It was resolved that the Commission ought not to sit in secret, that if it did Unionis s should not attend, and that a committee of working men should be formed to attend proceedings, their expenses being paid by a rate per member. The proceedings were perfectly orderly, but there are signs of a curious divergence of feeling on the subject of the Sheffield outrages, a good many trades, with the Printers foremost, being apparently inclined to see the outrages pretty sharply put down. This feeling was strong enough to defeat a motion for co-operation with the Sheffield Defence Committee, and the vote reveals an
