

Hon. Chas. Fisher has been appointed to the Judge ship vacated by His Honor Gov. Wilnot. The Privy Council have sent his appointment to Governor-General at Quebec, for Confirmation.

BEARS.—A bear was caught at Oak Bay, Charlotte Co., on the 22nd ult.; and one was killed at Pettingal Corner.

JEWELLERIES.—Mr. Lawlor's Watch-making establishment was entered by thieves on Sunday morning, and some old watch-cases and watches were stolen. An attempt to enter Mr. Rowe's (watch-maker's) shop at Foster's Corner was made, but the thieves appear to have been scared away after removing the slutters, &c.

ACCIDENT.—The wife of W. McLeod, Esq., of Round Hill, Thebych, K. C., while driving the other day, was thrown from the wagon and under the wheels, which passed over her neck. The injuries she received were less severe than might have been expected.

THE TOBACCO FACTORY.—We are glad to see the Tobacco Factory of Messrs. J. & K. Reed again in operation. The business is carried on with much brilliancy, and it gives remunerative employment to about sixty hands.—*Jb.*

RED RIVER.—The suffering at Red River is said to be very great. The Ottawa correspondence of the *Journal*, says that about 1000 have been subscribers in **OTAWA** towards the Relief Fund. "Mr. Sanford Flewelling, Engineer of the International Railroad, came handsomely down with the \$400."

Sixteen American fishing schooners put into Picton Harbor on Wednesday evening, 23rd ult. Some of them took nearly 1000 barrels of Mackerel that day. The *Journal* gives remunerative catch of fish, stirring along the Eastern shore is said to have been very large.

DISCOURAGING.—The results of col-fishing on the eastern coast of Newfoundland this season are most disastrous. In order that the expenses may be covered, it is necessary that every vessel employed should take at least 100,000 cod; but this year many have brought in 20,000, 35,000 or 30,000. Accordingly discouragement is general, and many of the owners of vessels have determined to fish no more. The resolution will deprive of occupation a large number of seamen of France. So says a letter from French St. Peters.—*Telegraph.*

DREADFUL EXPLOSION.—We learn by passengers from Windsor on Saturday night that on Friday morning a steam engine, used in hoisting at the railway works, and in course of construction at Windsor, exploded with terrible effect. One man was thrown into the air and killed instantly; a second only lived two or three hours; a third, about twenty-four hours; and a fourth was also nearly killed.—*Jb.*

Mr. A. T. Stewart's new colossal retail store in New York, is to be opened for business near the middle of October. This establishment will cover more than 100,000 square feet, and will be situated between Broadway and Fourth avenue, and Ninth and Tenth streets. It will be the largest retail dry-goods store in the world. The largest entire edifice in Europe, devoted to the same object is that of Morrison in London, and is less than half the size of this.

DEATH THROUGH CHILD-WHIPPING.—The New York *Commercial* report a recent case of child-whipping in one of the Brooklyn schools, which resulted in the death of the subject, a little girl of 8 years of age. In the process of punishing by the lady principal, the child was frightened and excited into fits; and being sent home with the marks of the rattan about her head, was seized with fits and died the next day.

The cattle disease still prevails in the vicinity of New Albany, Ind. It has lately broken out among the cows of the neighborhood, and seems to be again spreading throughout the State.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

An English paper says that within the past two years, Mr. Disraeli's government has appointed twenty judges, six bishops, thirteen peers, eleven baronets, and six knights, and has created five Privy Counsellors, nine Lord Lieutenants, four Knights of the Garter, and a long list of Ministerial offices, besides Cabinet offices.

Six hundred convicts joined Mr. Spurgeon's church last year.

Cable telegrams represent the complete triumph of the revolutionary party in Mexico. The French shells have left the Kingdom. The *Moniteur* gives the following account of the late movement of the Spanish Court: Her Majesty the Queen of Spain and the members of the Royal Family who were with her at San Sebastian crossed the frontier on the 30th ult. The Emperor and Empress arrived at Biarritz, where the Queen had an interview with Emperor Napoleon and the Empress Eugenie. After a brief visit the Queen and family left Biarritz for the Castle of Pau, which has been assigned to Her Most Catholic Majesty as a residence during her sojourn in France.

The French Generals on the Spanish frontier have been withdrawn.

All the Spanish fugitives who were arrested at the boundary line have been released.

It is reported that when the Queen of Spain left San Sebastian, she took with her all the Crown jewels, and a large civic and military procession escorted the Queen through the city. The houses, sidewalks, and public squares along the route were crowded with citizens, who received Serrano and his generals with enthusiasm.

The procession was followed by a parade and review of the National Guard. This was a grand military display, and was made the occasion of striking manifestations of the popular will.

The troops carried side by side with their flags, banners on which were inscribed "Down with the Revolution!" "Sovereignty of the people!" "Religious Liberty!" "Free Education!" and other mottoes of a similar character. At the termination of the review Marshal Serrano made a patriotic address to the immense multitude of citizens and soldiers, in the course of which he announced that he had accepted the crown. Prim in calling Marshal Espares, Duke of Victoria, to the head of the Government.

The formation of a new Cabinet has been completed. It is composed as follows:—Marshal Serrano, President; Costello, Minister of Commerce; Topete, Minister of Marine; Aguirre, Minister of Justice; Canales, Minister of War; Olague, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Muliz, Minister of Finance.

Manuel de la Cucha has been arrested.

It is rumored that a conspiracy to dethrone Abdul Aziz, the reigning Sultan of Turkey, has been discovered in Constantinople, and that a number of political prisoners have been made. No further particulars have been received.

A despatch from Alexandria of Oct. 1st, says:—While the Viceroy of Egypt was visiting an illumination in a narrow street in Cairo an attempt was made to assassinate him by dropping a steel ball upon him. The ball hit him, but he was not injured. The perpetrator is unknown.

LONDON, OCT. 5.—A contract for the construction of an underground railway in New York has been awarded with the English engineers who built the underground railway in London. They expect to start upon the work at an early day. W. B. Dunlop, who sailed from Liverpool on the steamer *Commodore*, yesterday took out the contract for the approval of the directors.

A rumor is current that the success of the revolution in Spain has had the effect to induce France to make some important concessions to Italy. It is known that Prime Minister Menabrea is expected in Paris, and the supposition is that he comes to direct the negotiations rendered necessary by the altered change in the policy of France.

Queen Isabella has issued a protest against the revolution in Spain. The document argues that the revolution is against the rights of the monarch, and declares that she is in Spain to the throne, and that she declares the acts of the Junta, established by violence, are not binding upon the people.

A new deep-sea submarine telegraph direct from London to Alexandria, Egypt, was successfully completed Saturday last.

A despatch from Madrid states that Olague who has named as Minister of Foreign Affairs declines the position in the new Cabinet. Adaz has resigned the Presidency of the Junta and Aguirre succeeds him. Olague has appointed Marshal Serrano General-in-Chief of the army. Gen. Prim is expected in Madrid to-morrow.
