### EATING CLOUDS.

Dr. Livingstone, relating his adventures on Lake Nyassa, thus tells of one curiosity which he fell in

During a portion of the year, the northern dwellers on the lake have a harvest which furnishes a singular kind of food. As we approached our limit in that direction, clouds, as of smoke rising from miles of burning gass, were observed bending in a southeasterly direction, and we thought that the unseen land on the opposite side was closing in, and that we were near the end of the lake.

But next morning we sailed through one of the clouds on our own side, and discovered that it was neither smoke nor haze, but countless millions of minute midges called "kungo" (a cloud or fog). They filled the air to an immense height, and awarmed upon the water, too light to sink in it,

Eyes and mouth had to be kept closed while passing through this living cloud; they struck upon the face like fine drifting snow. Thousands lay in the boat when she emerged from the cloud of midges.

The people gather those minute insects by night and boil them into thick cakes, to be used as a relish -millions of midges in a cake.
