REGULATIONS.

Governing Drawbacks under the 10th sec. 31 Vic. cap. 44, on the exportation of duty paid articles in certain cases. 10. The manufacturers of any article, wholly manufactured in this Dominion out of materials imported into it, and upon which any duty of Customs has been paid, shall, upon the exportation of the said manufactured article, be entitled to a drawback equal to the duties that shall have been paid upon such quantity of the raw or duty paid material as shall have entered into and been consumed in the oduction of the manufactured article to be exported. 20. To entitle himself to the drawback, the manufac

turer shall comply with the following conditions :-1.-He shall make due entry of the manufactured article

for exportation, and deliver to the Collector of the Port, where such entry is made, a statement showing the marks and numbers of the packages,-the designation of the contents of such packages,—the quantity of the manufac-tured article,—the place where manufactured—the quan-tity of the raw and duty paid materials entering into the composition of the said manufactured articles,—the date or dates of the importation of such raw material,-the number of the entry or entries of such raw material,-the amount of duty paid on the same, and the Port at which entered and paid, -- the port or place in the Foreign Country to which such manufactured article is to be exported and the name of the vessel or Line of Railroad by which the exportation is intended to be made.

2.-To the foregoing statement, which shall be made out in the form prescribed by the Customs Department, the following oath shall be attached and taken by the manufacturer before the Collector, viz:
