

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The telegrams received show that Fenianism continues to work out its murderous designs, notwithstanding the precautions taken by the British Government. The demonstrations, mock funerals, and the multitude of attempts to injure private individuals who were supposed to have been connected with executing the law in the case of the Manchester criminals, show the sympathy that exists with the movement in many places. The attempt to destroy the lives of prominent individuals by addressing letters to them containing combustible material; the Clerkenwell explosion, and what is transpiring elsewhere, make it evident that the Government will have some trouble, accompanied with much expense, to curb the murderous spirit of these wretched beings.

While we may feel pity for the dupes of the leading spirits of Fenianism, no such feeling can be entertained for the leaders themselves. There can be no excuse offered for such; when overtaken by justice no marked sympathy should be awakened for them. Leniency ceases to be a virtue when exercised towards creatures who incite rapine and bloodshed—who destroy innocent life without any cause whatever.

A telegram to the St. John Press, received Jan. 4, states that the head-quarters of the Fenians on the continent has been discovered in the Faubourg du Temple by the Paris police. Documents revealing the plans, &c., of the brotherhood were found and delivered to the British authorities.

The examination of Desmond, Allan and others, alleged to be implicated in the Clerkenwell explosion, has resulted so far in producing no satisfactory evidence as to the guilt of any of the accused. The affair almost as much a mystery as it was before the investigation commenced. The magistrate has adjourned the examination one week.

THE CLERKENWELL EXPLOSION.—The following account of the explosion is from an English paper:—About 4 p. m., two men and a woman brought a barrel on a truck and placed it against the wall of Clerkenwell House of Detention, in Corporation row; they then lit a fuse, and a tremendous explosion took place. The wall was driven in, leaving a gap sixty feet at the top, and narrowing to ten feet at the bottom. The men and woman ran away, but were arrested. The house opposite was destroyed, and nearly thirty houses adjoining are more or less injured, while in the adjoining street an immense amount of glass is destroyed. Forty persons, including women and children, are in the hospital; three are dying. Firemen are working in the ruins, searching for bodies. A large body of police are in the prison yard, and a detachment of guards in the prison. The prisoners are working in the yard where the prisoners take exercise. There is little doubt that the object was to liberate Burke and Carey; but to-day these men were taken for a walk in another enclosed space, consequently the attempt failed. The report was heard at a great distance, and the event has caused considerable excitement and great indignation at the reckless disregard of life and property.

Thousands of persons were attempting to get near the scene of the outrage. All the approaches were kept by police armed with cutlasses. The force of the explosion was so great that masses of bricks were hurled 70 or 80 feet into the prison yard.

Lord Strathmore, Commander in Chief of the Forces in Ireland, is actively engaged in disposing of troops to meet a possible outbreak. Particular attention is directed to the Counties of Cork and Tipperary, where extraordinary precautions are being taken. The banks of the River Shannon and the West coast of the island are guarded with increased vigilance to prevent a landing. The police in the large cities are unusually active and watchful, especially in the South. The Government is in receipt of information relative to the movements of Fenians. Public excitement has by no means abated. Saturday's despatches from Cork state that a body of Fenians last night surreptitiously entered the magazine in that city, and unchallenged carried away more than a half a ton of blasting powder. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the bold act. The people stand aghast at the audacity of the Fenians. The clergy of the City of Limerick have addressed the following resolutions to a document declaring there can be no peace in Ireland unless treated like Hungary.

Baron Von Goltz was received to day by the Emperor Napoleon as the Ambassador from Prussia and of the Confederation of the North German States. The Baron assured the Emperor of the earnest desire of his Majesty, the King of Prussia for peace and for close friendship with France. Napoleon replied in reply expressed in warm terms his approval of the reply of Northern Germany and hoped that Baron Von Goltz would continue to promote the peaceful relations between Prussia and France.

King Victor Emmanuel in reply to an address of both Houses of the Italian Parliament says that Italy is now passing through a crisis, and that he, by her foes, but he hopes for a good result and advises the Parliament and people to be calm.

Mr. Goldwin Smith has published a second letter to the Irish question, which gives the practical scheme which he has proposed, though he does not consider it his province as a political student to plan the details, thinking that this should be left to the statesman. Four points he mentions: 1. The residence of the Court at Dublin (we presume he means during part of the year), to make Dublin a capital, visibly to assure the people of the interest felt in them by the Government. 2. An occasional session of Parliament in Dublin, say once in three years, partly for the same reason, and partly on account of the peculiar circumstances of Ireland. 3. A liberal measure of local self-government for Ireland, giving each province a council of its own; which, subject of course to the supremacy of Parliament, should legislate on all matters not essential to the political and legal unity of the empire, including local education. 4. He would entrust to these councils the administration of the funds now belonging to the consolidated Established Church, taking the revenues arising from its own territory.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Lord Stanley, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, acting upon the recommendations of the Sublime Porte, has prepared a dispatch protesting against the alleged intrigues of Russian agents in Roumania.

Reports are received at St. Petersburg from Siberia of the discovery of rich and extensive gold deposits on the Amur River.

The natives were flocking to the gold regions by thousands. So great was the excitement that troops had been sent by the Governor of the district to preserve order and guard the mines, and separate and bloody conflicts have taken place between the natives and soldiers.
