**OUR RAILWAYS.**—A meeting to take into consideration the best mode to be adopted in order that this Province may be relieved of the debt contracted by it for the purpose of facilitating our railways, now completed and in course of construction, and to urge upon the Dominion Government the commercial and other advantages that would accrue by the immediate completion of that portion of the New Brunswick and Canada railway lying between Woodstock and River du Loup, is called by Sheriff Dibblee, meet in the Mechanics' Institute, Woodstock, on the 10th instant.—*Newspaper.*

The Woodstock Iron Works have again commenced operations, with fair prospects of doing a good business. Mr. Best, we learn, has secured both the capital and the market necessary to give permanency to this important undertaking.—*Courier.*

We regret to learn that Mr. S. B. Easty, long and favorably known in connection with the "American House," now kept by his son, died on Thursday at Upper Gagetown. He was very widely known and is generally esteemed in all his relations in life.—*Journal.*

The News states that the hotel projected by Mr. Reynolds on Prince William Street and the Market Square, will, if built, have a frontage of 93 feet by 70 feet in depth, and an ell 71 feet by 41 feet, and will be seven stories in height, and have 139 rooms. Plans have been prepared by Mr. Stead.

A number of cars for Western Extension have been landed here from a vessel from the United States.

It is reported from Ottawa that Major C. R. Ray has been gazetted Lt.-Col. of the Volunteer Battalion.

A correspondent of the *Express*, writing from Port Maitland, says, two dwelling houses at that place, owned and occupied respectively by Capt. Freeman Park and Joseph Letson, Esq., were destroyed by fire on the 17th inst. Loss partly covered by insurance. In Mr. Letson's cellar were stored 600 bushels of potatoes, owned by Mr. Joseph Lowden of Cornwallis, which are a total loss.

The Windsor and Annapolis railroad is rapidly approaching completion. The track has been laid to within seven miles of Annapolis, and all the important bridges on the road are in a very forward state. The whole road will be finished in time. Two boats, now building on the Clyde, will connect at Annapolis for this city. It is expected that they will make the trip in four hours.

A coal mine has been discovered near Spencer's Island, Cumberland county. The *Borderer* says:—"The vein is reported to be of good thickness, six feet at the minimum, and as the shipping facilities are excellent, there would seem to be most promising prospects of successful working. We understand other residents of Sackville are interested in the enterprise."

A despatch from Montreal of Jan. 28th says:—"Judge Courchesne is about to resign and re-enter political life.

Mr. Sims, Manager of the Royal Canadian Bank at Kingston, was arrested to day on a charge of conspiracy to defraud.

Another batch of petitions from French Canadians wishing to return from the United States was to-day presented to the Quebec Legislature.

The Governor General's visit absorbs attention at Montreal, and great preparations are being made for his reception. He will arrive at 5 o'clock on Monday evening and will dine with Mayor Workman.

In the Legislative Council of Quebec yesterday, several members highly complimented Sir John Young, but were very severe on Lord Monk.

TORONTO, Feb. 1.—With regard to the new arrangement with Nova Scotia, an Ottawa correspondent says:—"Sir John A. McDonald has agreed to bring a measure before Parliament to provide that the Nova Scotia debt in her coming into the Union shall be fixed at a fraction over nine millions, being two millions more than fixed by the Constitution. An annual subsidy is to be paid Nova Scotia from the public purse for ten years at eight thousand per annum.

The Province Building in Halifax which cost \$250,000.00 is to be taken possession of by the Dominion and Nova Scotia paid for expenditures on it.

A despatch was received from the Colonial Office on Saturday stating that no further consideration of the appeal would be held by the Gladstone government. This has induced Mr. Howe to enter the Cabinet at once.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1.—Governor arrived at 5 o'clock, and was received by the Mayor, Corporation, and a large body of citizens. Guards of Honor were at the depot. Howe, Rose and Campbell accompanied his Excellency.

An extra official *Gazette* contains the appointment of Joseph Rose as a member of the Privy Council of Nova Scotia, as President of the Privy Council. Vice-Roy Ferguson Blair, deceased.

The Railway Commissionership has been spoken of for McLennan.

The Governor General has, under the authority of the Railways Act of 1868, appointed Sir John A. Macdonald, Tilley, Rose and Langton to constitute the proposed directory.

Following are terms of agreement between Howe and McLennan and Dominion Government. We send them as official:—

Nova Scotia is to get a supplemental subsidy from the Federal Treasury proportionate to New Brunswick, namely, about \$52,000. The subsidies will continue to receive the same sum for her population until the population reaches 400,000, when these subventions are believed to be sufficient to pay all the expenses of her Local Government. Third, the Federal Government will assume, besides the eight millions of Nova Scotia debt already stipulated, about four millions more, being the sum supposed to be laid out by her on public works during the two years which have passed since the Quebec Conference.

### BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Ernest Jones, a well known politician, and formerly leader of the Chartist Party, died on January 26th. He had just been informally chosen by ballot over Nelson Gibson, a liberal candidate, to succeed Mr. Bailey, present member of Parliament from Manchester, the latter should be unseated on a charge of bribery.

Official despatches have been received by the War Office from New Zealand. They announce that a battle had taken place between the British troops and the Maori Rebels at Poverty Bay, and that the latter were defeated with a great loss in killed, wounded and prisoners.

The victory had restored tranquillity in that quarter of the colony.

Salmon ova are being exported from England to New Zealand, 100,000 eggs packed in ice, were sent off one day last month.

Mr. Peabody has sent a cheque for £100 to the Mayor of Brighton, for distribution among the poor of the town.

Lord Monk, late Governor General of Canada, has been appointed Chairman of the Franco American Cable Company.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Advices from Madrid state that the first business of the Constitutional Cortes soon to assemble will be to establish a Directory to govern the country until a Sovereign is chosen.

The Ministers replied that they would refer the whole subject to the Constitutional Cortes.
