

nearer than 100 yards from the shore, and the water was there six or seven feet in depth. Passengers threw themselves into the water and attempted to grasp the shore, but in the terror and confusion, that of two hundred and fifty eight persons who were on board, only 28 escaped with their lives. There was a large number of ladies and children on board, all of whom, except two or three, are supposed to have perished—either burned or drowned. It is the most terrible and heart-rending disaster that has occurred on the Mississippi for years. When will card playing be prohibited on board steamers?

ACCIDENT ON THE NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.—The Halifax Express records a serious accident, resulting in the loss of life on the Nova Scotia Railroad. The boiler of Engine No. 12, exploded, just before the train left Truro for Halifax, instantly killing the driver, John McCarroll, and scalding the fireman, James McCauley. McCauley leaves a wife and two children. McCauley will probably recover, though his injuries are severe.

INQUEST.—Coroner Earl held an inquest on Monday morning on the body of a man named Daniel Whelan, drowned on Saturday evening at the mill at Drury's Cove. He had been in town and returned to the Cove in company with some other workmen at the mill. Leaving them, he went to his boarding house. In doing so he had to pass over a new wharf on course of erection, off which he must have fallen, as his body was found some distance from the wharf. He was a man well advanced in years, as his family has grown up, and married, most of them living near Sussex, where deceased had a farm. Verdict—Accidentally drowned.—Globe.

UNIFORM CURRENCY.—We trust the Dominion Government will feel itself in a position to bring in a measure during the next session of Parliament for facilitating the currency throughout the Dominion Provinces. The existing difference between the currency of Nova Scotia and that of this Province, is a source of perpetual annoyance, inconvenience and loss to the people here doing business with Nova Scotia people. It is high time to do away with the cause of trouble to the commercial community, and a hindrance to the comfortable transaction of inter-provincial business. Nothing but the most imperative consideration can justify the longer postponement of this much needed assimilation.—News.

TEMPERANCE NORTH.—A meeting of representatives of the different Temperance organizations of Northumberland County, met at Newcastle last Tuesday and passed the following resolution:—

"Whereas, The Licensing the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors in this County is attended with great injury to the morals of the people and debasing to humanity, Therefore Resolved, That the different Temperance Organizations of this County be requested to have Petitions circulated for signature, to be laid before the January Session, praying the Bench not to grant licences for the Sale of Liquors in this County."

The Convention meets again on the last Tuesday in December.

A VETERAN OF OUR OWN.—It may probably not be generally known, that in the day of the late war, who participated in the conflict at Waterloo, are getting to be few in number, that there is one residing in our midst. Mr. Henry A. Lattimore, the old veteran of whom we speak, is now nearly 80 years of age, and resides in Duke Street. He participated in all the principal battles fought by the "Iron Duke" from 1812, till the final overthrow of Napoleon at Waterloo. He was three times wounded: first by a cannon ball on the top of his forehead; second, by a musket ball in his right arm; and third, by a missile of the same kind in his left arm. He was one of the bravest who were blown "sky high" at San Sebastian in Spain, and one of the very few who escaped destruction. He witnessed the flight of Napoleon, which immediately ensued after the fatal order was given by his great rival in the Empire at the time of the battle of Waterloo. He was present at the execution of General Ney, doing duty as a sentinel. The Corps to which he belonged was the 25th; and he received his discharge in 1830, after serving for about twenty five years. He is still hale and hearty, and rather old, than otherwise of fighting over again his old battles.

PROGRESS.—"W. W. Traflet," writing to the *Charlottetown Standard*, from Gordon, Tobique, says: "Our settlement is increasing rapidly. I live thirty-one miles off the Tobique river; when I first came here, in 1863, there was no road further up than 16 miles from the mouth; no way to get along but to follow the shore, and no place at which to find lodging at night, and now the river sides are dotted with houses, and wagons have gone up fifty miles this summer, and we have a weekly mail."

Governor Macgavie, in the course of his tour through British Columbia last month, penetrated into the mountain fastnesses of Cariboo and was received by the hardy miners in a most hearty manner. The notice of His Excellency's visit was short, but on the evening before, the people went to work with a will, prepared addresses, and decorated the streets of Barkerville with arches, flags and mottoes. The Chinese took a prominent place in the programme, and presented an address to the Governor, which was not to be outdone by anybody, was profuse in the matter of banners, on many of which were inscribed the mottoes, "The Union forever," and "Success to the Dominion"—in Chinese characters. At the termination of the demonstration, cheer after cheer was given to the Queen, Governor Macgavie, and the Dominion of Canada.—Globe.

FREE.—We learn that on the evening of Friday last, the dwelling house of Mr. Charles Hoyt, and several adjoining buildings of smaller dimensions, were destroyed by fire at Bridgetown, N. S.—Tel.

JAMMED.—Shubal Cochran, timekeeper on the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Works at Windsor, on jumping from a scow to the wharf missed his footing and was jammed between the scow and wharf, dislocating his ankle and otherwise bruising him seriously.

ACCIDENT FROM FIREARMS.—On Friday last, Messrs. Arthur J. Rickards, G. P. Payant and Charles Vaughn were out on the Chester road partridge shooting. They had very good luck and were returning home in the wagon. Vaughn did not remove the cap from his gun, which had no half cock catch; the jolting over the rough roads caused it to discharge and the muzzle being close to Mr. Rick-

ard's ankle, he received the whole charge of the shot, there. They were then twenty seven miles from Windsor; over half that distance he had to take the reins and drive. They made a change at Mr. Palmer's, and drove home as quick as possible, where medical aid was at once procured and the wound dressed. His ankle was very much shattered, large pieces of bone had to be removed, and it is not yet known how serious the injury may be.—Windsor Mail.

URSET.—A party of fifteen persons was thrown out of a wagon at Ellershouse, N. S. last week, and all were more or less injured. One man had his shoulder bone broken, and a young lady broke her ankle.

The Gale on Wednesday evening of last week, appears to have been severe on the Eastern shore of Nova Scotia as well as on the Western and Northern. A Halifax paper, of Thursday's date, says, "Shipping on the coast had a hard time during the gale last night. The schooner *Perseverance*, from Sydney with a load of coal, was tossed into harbor in such manner, both masts were broken. The Captain and crew, vessels had made the Eastern Passage and anchored before the gale came on, and rode it out in safety. Others anchored outside, also escaped without injury.—Tel.

THE CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY.
(From Telegram to the Daily Telegraph.)
MONTREAL, 3d Nov.—Canada Pacific Railway Company will apply to next Session of Dominion Parliament for an Act of Incorporation, &c., &c. They do not intend to ask pecuniary assistance, by guarantee or otherwise, but free grants of land in alternate blocks set off on each side of the Railway line, to be divided into Nipigon Section, 1250 miles long, from Fort Garry to lines in Ontario.

Second—Assiniboine Section, 1150 miles, from Fort Garry to the Rocky Mountains.

Third—Red River Section, 75 miles from Fort Garry to Pembina and the American frontier, to connect with American Railways.

The projectors will ask authority to raise twenty million pounds, to be used in the purchase of land, as requisite, as well as progress. The company will issue not more than one million stock for each 100 miles, and fresh stock not more than one million for every successful hundred miles division. All such stock to rank alike.

The projectors will first construct the line from Fort Garry to the Rocky Mountains, and then the American frontier and 25 miles toward the Rocky Mountains. This will open immediate access to Fort Territory and induce rapid emigration. The Railway will scatter settlers as it goes. The Red River Section will be extended to the Pacific as soon as authority is obtained from British Columbia, or from the Dominion. Nipigon Section will be immediately explored and surveyed by Government and Company Engineers. The projectors speak very confidently of the success of the enterprise, promising a dividend of 28 per cent for the Red River Section—equal to Panama Railway. Under the Charter no competition can arise. They will largely employ Chinese labor in the construction. By beginning the line at Fort Garry, the road will pay almost as it is built, inducing further investment of capital.

Until the Nipigon Section is constructed traffic will flow by St. Paul, Chicago and Detroit to Canada; but through Canadian Line will soon be built.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Weather cold and frosty throughout Great Britain.

The Times has an editorial in approval of Secretary of State's advocacy of paying the National debt in gold.

The remains of the late Earl of Derby were interred at Knowles yesterday without ceremony.

George Peabody's health is slightly improved. The Queen has expressed much interest in his condition.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Italy will reject any decision made by the Ecumenical Council which may be opposed to the laws of the land and the spirit of the age.

The Duke of Genoa is now the prominent candidate for King of Spain.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—A Royal Decree has been promulgated appointing the 10th of November as a day of fasting and prayer. The Decree refers to the great religious movements which now agitate Europe and calls on the people to petition for divine guidance and protection.

A recent meeting at Limerick to discuss the land question, was broken up by a mob of Fenian sympathizers, the whole affair ending in a disgraceful riot.

Paris is perfectly tranquil.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The cities of Frankfurt, Wiesbaden and Mayence with the surrounding country in each case were visited by shocks of earthquake during the night of the 31st ult., and yesterday morning.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The Empress Eugenie has pressed her determination to pass through the Suez Canal. Recent soundings show that water in the shallow parts of the Canal has a depth of twenty feet.

Archbishop Cullen of Dublin has publicly denounced Fenianism and threatened members of secret Fenian organizations with excommunication.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—A Paris despatch says it is a popular impression in that city that Napoleon will propose a plan of disarmament in his speech before the French Legislature, and that the idea is likely to become general.

It is said Lord Clarendon conveyed the assurance of England's approval of a course to his Majesty and that it will be agreeable to Russia.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Latest accounts confirm the first reports giving the loss of life by the burning of the steamer *Stonewall* on the Mississippi at not less than two hundred.

The Governor of Maine has appointed Lot M. Morrill, United States Senator, in place of Mr. Pennington, deceased.

The reduction of the national debt during October amounts to seven million dollars.

Thirty-eight of the men who were lost by the wreck of the American ship "J. P. Whitney" in the Indian Ocean.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Capt. Higgins and the other officers of the steamer *Cuba*, except seven, have been exchanged from *Cuba*.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The Board of Education in Cincinnati, Ohio, voted to exclude the Bible from Public Schools, 22 to 15.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The Democrats carried New York State in the election yesterday.
