Some discussion. It was understood that Government should have a number of copies of Russell's book on North-West published and distributed free to each member.

Message from Senate announced passage of Supply Bill without amendment. House adjourned at 12:15 o'clock to prorogue at four.

The number of members yet here is larger than usual at prorogation. At 4 o'clock the Governor General proceeded in State to the Senate Chamber.

Seventy bills were presented to, and two, the bill for relief of John H. Stinson, and a bill for the relief of Governor General, reserved for the consideration of Her Majesty's pleasure.

The attendance of spectators was smaller than usual. The St. John Grammar School Examination terminated successfully on Tuesday, a very large attendance of spectators, including many ladies, adding interest to the proceedings. The classes in Greek, Latin, and French occupied the principal part of the day. The French Prize was awarded to Master Seely who also takes the Corporation Medal. Owing to the change in the time of holding the Examination, the period for preparing the English Essays is extended to the opening of the school, which will take place on the 5th day of August.—Telegraph.

Gold At River, Yukon Co.—A few days ago, Mr. David Thomas, who owns a tannery at Koi River, while breaking up some quartz rock on his land, near McAdams' mills, discovered that it contained gold. The quartz was examined, and the portion lying on the surface, was found to contain about fifty dollars worth of the precious metal. No doubt, the property will be mined immediately. Mr. Thomas refused a handsome offer for the mining right, as soon as gold was known to exist on the land.—Idaho.

Napoleon is reported to be endeavoring to suppress a book on Mexico, which Jurez is about to issue in Brussels, and which will contain all the secret despatches sent by Napoleon to Maximilian, with other very important papers which Louis Napoleon prefers should never see the light.

It is announced that in five years, the communication by rail, between Paris and Constantinople will be completed. The time occupied between the two cities will be sixty-nine hours. It is estimated that the force employed upon the road will amount to more than 100,000 men.

A duel was recently fought at Niagara Falls, between a New York editor and a Canadian. Three shots were exchanged without injury to either combatants. The fourth shot was then demanded and fired, which resulted in the wounding of the rebel in both legs.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

MADRID, June 18.—The political situation in Spain is far from satisfactory to the friends of that country. The republicans are dissatisfied with the action of the Cortes in establishing a Regency, and trouble is expected to arise when Marshal Serrano takes the oath of his new office.

LONDON, June 20.—Later advices from Melbourne report trouble in the Colonial Parliament continued. The members expelled for bribery had been re-elected, and the parties guilty of bribing the legislators, and who were sent to jail by order of Parliament, had been released by the judges on the ground of wrongful commitment. Parliament now appeals to the Privy Council.

On taking the oath of office yesterday as Regent of Spain, Marshal Serrano, a Spaniard, in which he promised to respect the constitution and liberties of the country. President Rivera, in reply, assured him of the support of all Spaniards.

The Times, in its article on the passage of the Irish Church Bill to its second reading, says that the Bill has passed by a large majority, and a possible termination of the Session is now assured. The great triumph is not so much a triumph for the Ministers as it is for the power of public opinion and the machinery of the Constitution.

The first says that the great debate must increase the people's estimation of the House of Peers. The judgment furnishes additional proof of the utility of the Upper House.

The second reading is but a preliminary to moulding the Bill into a form better to satisfy the nation. LONDON, June 21.—The Steamship Great Eastern, arrived at Brest on Sunday night and yesterday morning the shore and ocean lines of the new Atlantic Cable having been completed, she sailed for Miquelon and St. Pierre.

The announcement of the sudden death of Henry J. Raymond, which was received here by Cable on Saturday, created a deep feeling of sorrow. Several of the London papers eulogize deceased.

LONDON, June 22.—In the House of Lords this evening the Earl of Shaftesbury gave notice of an amendment to the bill for the disestablishment of the Irish Church to the following effect:—That the surplus church property shall be a fund from which to grant loans to the Irish peasantry.

Charles Napier Stuart, a member of Parliament for Dorchester, died from cholera.

Ismael Pacha, Viceroy of Egypt, arrived in London today. He is the guest of the Queen at Buckingham Palace, which has been fitted up for his residence. A series of brilliant fêtes have been arranged in his honor, and will take place during his stay in this country.

LONDON, June 23.—Five thousand emigrants left Liverpool the week ending Saturday night for different parts in America.

BRUSSELS, June 23.—The Session of the Zollverein, Parliament and Reichstag, terminated today.

MADRID, June 22.—The Republican members of the Cortes are about to issue a manifesto, advising all their supporters to swear allegiance to the constitution, if positively required so to do.

The clergy consider it their policy to reject the oath as a body.

PARIS, June 23.—Advices from the steamship Great Eastern are up to Tuesday noon. At that time she was 174 miles out from Brest, paying out the cable nicely. The weather was pleasant and all on board well.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—On the 12th inst. Secretary Fish addressed official letters to British Minister informing him of action of House of Representatives at the last session recommending a renewal of negotiations for the arrangement of trade with Canada, and inviting Mr. Thornton's co-operation with view to negotiation of a convention concerning the interchange of products, free navigation of the St. Lawrence, freedom of the Gulf in shipping fisheries and such other matters as may be embraced in the general subject of the trade relations between the United States and Canada. The British Government has given the Canadian authorities practical control of these subjects so far as they are concerned, and it is expected that the Canadian commissioners will arrive here immediately to confer with and assist the British Minister in consideration of the proposed convention.
