## THE NEWS AND THE PRESS.

AUGUST 20, 1869.

ITEMS.—A boy named Donohue was killed at Railway Station, by a train passing over him, on Sunday last; at the coroner's inquest, jury returned verdict of accidental death.—The St. Andrew's Society will hold their Annual Picnic at Britain's Point, on the 24th inst.—The S. S. Acadia arrived at this port on Sunday, and sailed again, direct for Liverpool, on Thursday. She brought out 16 passengers and a large quantity of merchandise.—The picnic season is now at its height.—The Phoenix Cricket Club of Halifax have challenged all New Brunswick; their challenge will probably be accepted.—H. M. war steamer *Delphin*, is now in this port.—The steamer *Rothsley* Castle got ashore near Shediac on Wednesday, the steamer *Serret* which went to her relief, met with the same fate. At latest accounts they were both still ashore. The passengers have been all safely landed.—The celebrated Key vs. Thompson case is again before the court at St. Andrews.—The Horse Railroad to Indian town is nearly completed. A number of gentlemen enjoyed a ride on it from Market Square to Indian town on Tuesday, time 12 minutes, including detention by cars getting off track.—The Windsor and Annapolis Railway was formally opened on Wednesday.—The Governor-General, General Doyle and a great number of lesser lights were present to give zest to the very important event. The road is nearly completed the whole distance from Annapolis to Grand Pre—84 miles, and passes through the very finest portion of the Province.

What has become of the Government School Bill printed copies of which were promised last Session? PONSINO CASE.—A few minutes past five o'clock, yesterday afternoon, a man said to be Mr. Thomas Ellison, who some years since, kept a Daguerrotype Salon, at Foster's Corner, King Street, went into Mr. Gowan's, near the Marsh Bridge, and called for a glass of water. On receiving the tumbler, he poured into it from a vial, which he took from his pocket, about one and half ounces of leadum, and drank the whole! He then informed the by-standers what he had taken, adding that he would be dead in twenty-five minutes. Just then Dr. Walker, who happened to be passing at the time, was called in, and he had him conveyed at once to the Hospital, and assisted Dr. Berteaux, Resident Physician to remove the poison from his stomach by a means of stomach pump. The patient expired, and was interred by the Doctor, that he had a short time previously taken about a quarter of the contents of the two ounce vial which, he alleged, was at first full. The vial bore a label with the name of J. F. Secord, Druggist, upon it. At latest accounts last evening he was likely to recover.—Ed.

TWO NORTH SHIPS STEAMERS AROUND.—We received the following Special Telegram last evening from Point du Chene:—

"Steamer *Serret* grounded coming up the harbor last night, in consequence of rudder gear getting foul. Steamer *Rothsley* Castle, two hours later, when coming up on her way from Campbellton, went to the assistance of *Serret*. While endeavoring to get her off she too, grounded. Both will get off to-night at high water. No damage to either."—Daily News.

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—Hon. Joseph Howe and Hon. Wm. McDougall left this morning for Thunder Bay to inspect the road now building from that point to Red River.

The Rideau Canal has been repaired and navigation is resumed.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—At a great Oration demonstration in Clones, Ireland, yesterday, 30,000 people took part in the procession.

At meetings in Thurles and Waterford resolutions were adopted asking for a general amnesty for the Fenians.

A riot took place yesterday in Sheffield, occasioned by the miners strike.

Austria is not to reduce her army, owing to the aspect of European affairs.

The Emperor Napoleon is suffering from rheumatism.

LONDON, August 17.—The weather is fair and favorable for growing crops.

The Pope has decided to hold a Universal Exhibition of Christian Art next year.

Funeral of Marshall Neil takes place to-day at Paris. Harvard and Oxford crews are out every day for practice. Betting to-day was five to one on Oxford's victory, three to one.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—The Dublin Municipal Council have adopted an address to Earl Spencer, Mr. Gladstone and Earl Grey, congratulating them and the country on the passage of the Irish Church Bill.

The Conservative members of the Council assented themselves when the vote on the address was taken. Archbishop Cullen has summoned the Roman Catholic bishops to meet in council for discussion of public questions.

LONDON, August 18.—Weather fair and favorable for crops. Liverpool markets quiet, without quotable change.

The Harvard and Oxford crews were out again last evening, the former in their new boat, built by Casper, and the latter in the new Salter boat. Darkness prevented any estimate of the work.

The Spanish Government is taking strong measures against Carlist insurgents. Nine Carlist prisoners were recently shot.

When the train reached here, the baggage car was entered, and the messenger and baggage man were found on the floor in the condition described above, almost dead. The safe was found open, and it is impossible at this time to give an estimate of the loss. All that can be said is, that it is very heavy.
