DREADFUL ACCIDENT - FOUR MEN DROWNED IN THE FALLS. - This morning five men, working in Messrs. A. Cushing & Co.'s mill, Union Point, as part of the night crew, left the mil, at the conclusion of work, in a boat to go to Indiantown, where some of them resided. In fact they always took this mode of re- released. turning home. The men's names were John J. Eagles, (the Surveyor) John Carvil!, his two sons, George and Howard, and George Hamilton. They took in the boat with them some spars intended to be used for firewood, and these projected over the stern of the boat. Thinking probably to save a little time, they rowed out, instead of rowing up, and the boat was soon caught by one of the whirls, ("the pots" as they are termed), at the head of the Falls, which canted her a little, and brought the spars on one side down to the water which catching in them upset the boat in a moment. Eagles, Howard Carvill repaired. and George Hamilton, were drawn down at once by the seething, boiling water. John Carvill caught a spar and managed to shove one to George, telling him at the same time to hold on. But the young man was too near the treacherous spot to extricate himself and he soon went down. The father managed to get out of the whirl, and a boot soon rescued him. The men were all steady, soher young men, and some if not all of them had been in Mersrs. Cushing's employ for three or four years. They had crossed and recrossed the place daily, and were aware of its dangerous character, but they probably miscalculated the force of the tide at this particular time. Hamilton was a married man and leaves a wife and one child. Eagles, who was a fine young fellow, was a son of Mr. Charles Eagles, and was soon to have been married. This dreadful occurrence has excited a widespread feeling of sympathy throughout the community with the families of the unfortunate men, and is one of the most heartrending disasters that has occurred at the Falls for a number of years. - Wednesday's Globe.
