THE FENIAN PRISONERS. - The following letter from Mr. Gladstone is in reply to the petitions to the British Government for the release of the Fenian prisoners, and is well worthy of perusal.

GENTLEMEN, -Her Majesty's Government have given full and most serious consideration to the letter which you were good enough to forward to me in the month of August, on behalf of the meetings at Limerick, estimated to have been attended by 30,000 persons. They have also carefully considered the memorials, addresses and resolutions which have proceeded from various bodies and public meetings in Ireland during the last few weeks, in favor of the reconnection with the Fenian conspiracy, and now undergoing their sentences.

These proceeding have varied much in their character. Loyal and peaceable persons have taken part ings which deserve every respect.
