

come from Vermont.—After forty years absence mackerel have returned to the shores of Newfoundland.—The prisoners, Davis, Driscoll, McCarron and Cameron, sentenced to the Penitentiary at the recent sitting of the Court in Fredericton, have been conveyed to that Institution.—The St. John River is full of logs, started by the great rise of water.—The shock of an earthquake, lasting two or three seconds, was felt at Newcastle last week.—The Dominion cutter "Ida E." the other day seized the American schooner "A. J. Franklin" for violation of the Fishery laws. The captured vessel had on board one hundred and twenty barrels of mackerel. So says the *Charlottetown Herald*.—One last week a half acre of land at Red Head sunk about ten feet or more. There was no shock sufficient to disturb persons in the immediate vicinity. Residents begin to be fearful of being swallowed up by the sea, says a contemporary.—Rowdiness seems on the increase in this city. A party of ruffians went so far on Sunday as to assault Captain Jones of the Portland Police.—The schooner "John R. Parker" is reported ashore at Quaco Lodge. She was laden with bricks. The crew saved.—A fire at Rothsay on Sunday destroyed a house.—The ex-Emperor is far from being in destitute circumstances, if a report now published in the papers be correct. It is to the effect that he has 63,000,000 francs invested in various places outside of France.—An Indian named Sachia Basine was burned to death in his camp at Union Point mills a few days ago. He was intoxicated at the time.—The "Ida Whittier" and "Gazelle," steamers of the up-river line, both recently disabled, are now undergoing repairs. It is hardly probable that they will be used again this season. The two remaining boats of the line are very busy. The accidents are to be regretted, as the loss to the enterprising proprietors must be quite heavy.—The steamer "Fawn," on her down trip on Tuesday evening, had 400 lbs. of potatoes on board.

Rise of water.—The rain of last week caused the water in the river to rise very rapidly and very high. Saturday's *Telegraph* says: "It is said that, during the past forty-eight hours, the rise in the lower St. John was greater than had been known, in the same length of time, in the past 20 years. The logs are coming down in abundance, and the heart of the lumberman is rejoiced."

GREAT SALE OF BANK STOCK.—On Saturday last, Mr. Stewart sold 93 shares of Bank of New Brunswick stock at Chubb's corner, making an able and characteristic speech on the occasion, and realizing the large price of 137. The sale was on behalf of the David Vaughan estate, for which most of the stock was bought in by Mr. James Robertson. The next largest purchaser was James Lawton, Esq. The proceeds of the sale exceeded \$14,000.—*Ed.*

BRIDGE AND OTHER STOCK.—Mr. W. D. Hubbard put up 44 shares of Suspension Bridge Stock on Saturday. Hon. R. L. Hazen purchased 23 shares at \$17.50 per share; J. W. Cudlip, Esq., bought 6 shares at \$17.25; and Mr. Baker purchased 6 shares at \$17.25 and 16 at \$17. Mr. Hubbard then offered 40 shares of \$20 each, the Street Railway stock, but he only sold 5 shares, for which Mr. C. L. Richards gave him \$11 per share.—*Globe.*

CARLETON BRANCH RAILWAY.—On Saturday, the contractor commenced to lay the rails on that portion of the Carleton Branch Railway lying between the Breakwater at Sand Point and Blue Rock Cutting. The line will be immediately utilized for the transport of stone from Blue Rock, to ballast the Breakwater. The rails for this work had to be hauled around what is popularly known as "Clark's Injunction." At the other end the rails are laid from Fairville Station across the main road, to or near Mr. Clark's land.—*Ed.*

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH AND THE NEW HOTEL COMPANY.—It is said the Company have been obliged to abandon the intention of placing a handsome Mansard roof on the new Hotel, because of the Church's opposition to the projection of the roof, which would extend over the Church's lawn some nine inches, although over stories in the air. They are also obliged to remove a brick base moulding, which, it was believed, would encroach on the Church land by about three-quarters of an inch, although it would have been an improvement to both properties.—*Ed.*

ACCIDENT ON WESTERN EXTENSION.—As the cars were passing along Western Extension, on the way to this city, on Saturday, a young man, under the influence of drink, was lying insensible beside the track near Kelly's Mill, at Macquoddy Lake. Before the engine driver noticed him, or could stop the engine, it passed over his right hand, severing the fore finger and crushing the thumb and middle finger. When the accident occurred he rose up, some of the cars came in contact with his head, which, although bleeding freely did not seem much hurt. The conductor took him on board, washed his wounds, and left him at Harvey Station, from which he was able to walk to Dr. Simpson's, a mile off. He will lose two fingers at least. He gave his name as Thompson, and said he was on his way to work at Scott's Mill.—*Ed.*

LOVELL'S DOMINION DIRECTORY.—An agent of Mr. John Lovell, of Montreal, Mr. William Hamilton Lovell, is now in this city, instructed to verify the printed lists of names of our citizens (which had been taken for the Dominion Directory). This morning a staff of assistants will start out, with the object of visiting every house, and making all necessary corrections in the proof lists. Mr. Lovell is sparing no pains or expense to make his great Directory the most perfect work of the kind ever published, and we trust that he will meet with the co-operation of our citizens, without exception.—*Ed.*

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The text of Granville's proposal to Prussia is published. He deplores the continuance of the war, and calls attention to the present state of affairs, and the misery it has entailed. He admits the reduction of Paris to be authorized by war usages, and urges an armistice, enabling the convocation of a Constituent Assembly and the establishment of peace, and believes that representations to France would not be without effect. The armistice commences on the 4th November and ends on the 28th.

A decree ordering the elections will be issued to-morrow.

The constituent Assembly is convoked to meet on the 11th inst.

The elections in Paris on the question of maintaining the powers of the Government of the National defence resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of the Government.

The National Guards marched in battalions to the polls and deposited their votes. They were all yes.

Seventy thousand Prussians from before Metz are halfway to Paris. Fifty thousand others are marching on Gernsbach at Bismarck's command.

Gernsbach has 20,000 men in his command.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The attempted revolution in Paris appears to be effectually suppressed.

The Government of National defence has resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of the Government.

The results of the City are nearly complete, with the exception of three rindsmen.

Ayes: 442,000. Noes: 49,000—a majority of 393,000.

Perfect tranquility existed in Paris. According to the latest reports, there has been no military movement since Sunday.

A despatch from a special correspondent of the *Tribune* at Berlin to-day says: that the negotiations for an armistice were broken off by Thiers under instructions from Paris. The reason has not been yet made public. Thiers is to leave for head-quarters for the coast of Brittany.

VERSAILLES, Nov. 6.—Thiers has received orders from Paris to break off the negotiations for an armistice, and to leave the royal headquarters.

The cause of the rupture is believed to be the persistence of Thiers in insisting on guarantees for the coast of Brittany.

The war goes on.

The Prussian ambassador at London says that the struggle will continue all winter.

The Council of War has passed resolutions in favor of the release of all political prisoners, and against the Italian occupation of Roman territory.

Reichardt has resigned his position on the Committee of defence in consequence of a misunderstanding with the Government on the question of Communal Elections. He has not been seen since.

A despatch to the Associated Press from London and a special despatch to one of the New York papers both declare that the negotiations for an armistice have been abruptly broken off by order of the Paris Government, which will not assent to the conditions required by Bismarck.

During the conference between Thiers and Favre the latter had been maintaining a steady front on the place of interview. The conference lasted over eight hours.

The general feeling is spreading all over France in favor of calling the Duc d'Aumale to the Presidency of the Republic.

Everything is quiet around Paris. There has been no fighting for some days.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—It is rumored that Mr. Gladstone will stand for London in the next parliamentary election in the place of Baron Lionel Rothschild.

The Barmes have withheld the Prussian loan which they intended to introduce to-day.

St. George Jenkinson, reported lost among the passengers of the steamship *Varuna* from New York for New Orleans, is at home in Gloucestershire.

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—The *Monitor* says: President, as she would not vote for the re-election of Thiers, Paris nor allow Alsace and Lorraine to vote in the election for delegates to the continuance of the war, Prussia and not France has refused the armistice.

All the journals here express the bitterest resentment at the refusal of Bismarck, who is preparing to negotiate for the suspension of hostilities, to grant time for the approach of reinforcements and ward off the attack of the army of the Loire which could have taken the offensive with advantage.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—Metz has been made the capital of German Lorraine.

The *Times* this morning has reason to believe that the bombardment of Paris will not begin for two weeks. King William is reluctant to destroy so grand a city, and is giving the French every opportunity for peace.

It is said that Baron Hansmann has been arrested. The French fortress of Belfort was invested on Thursday, the 31st inst.

General Changin says it was the incompetency of Bazaine, rather than treachery, that caused the disaster to the French army. We have not heard who the Government propose to name.—*Ed.*

TOURS, Nov. 8.—All quiet at Marseilles. The press of that city published a proclamation from the Emperor, recommending reconciliation, and setting aside all purposes, save that of the country's defence.

The Prussian Governor-General at Lorraine announces: Families and all male citizens, absent from their homes after a certain date, will be fined five francs per day, as long as their absence continues.

The Prussians continue to force the most eminent citizens, living on the railway lines, to ride upon the locomotives; the object being to prevent accidents to the trains.

Barbarity of the invaders increases in proportion to the resistance of the population.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A project of summoning the North German Parliament to meet at Versailles is taking shape and will probably be carried into effect.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Town of Verdun has capitulated to the Prussians.

Hansmann, the ex-Perpet of Paris, was arrested at his villa at Nice.

TORONTO, Nov. 8.—Despatches from the army of the Loire report successful engagements yesterday at Paisley and St. Laurent Des Bois.

Two battalions of Prussians supported by 1500 cavalry and 10 pieces of artillery, attacked the French advanced posts. After a combat of two hours duration the French appeared to be surrounded by the Prussians, and were killed, leaving two officers and fifty men killed and seventy prisoners in our hands. The French loss was four killed and thirty one wounded.

ROME, Nov. 4.—The Festival of San Carlo to-day fell fat. The customary ceremonies were omitted. The Pope celebrated Mass and addressed a few words to the congregation, assuring them at the conclusion of his allocution that the present order of things will soon come to an end, and the new year would be signalled by the triumph of the Apostolic cause.

At the same time, the Pope is reaching the Holy Father daily to prevent his acceptance of another monthly stipend of 250,000 francs offered him by the Italian Government for his civil list.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—There is no confirmation of the report, circulating in the *Gazette* de France, that demands an immediate election to put an end to the arbitrary rule of the Provisional Government.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The election resulted in electing Hoffman, Democrat, Governor, by about forty thousand majority, and Hall, Mayor of the city, by about twenty-five thousand. The Republicans lost a majority in the Legislature, but retained the majority in the Senate.
