If approved, the present Legislature of the Colony will be dissolved, and an election held in October. The new Chamber, a majority of which will be elective, meet in December, and decide upon the acceptance or rejection of the terms. If accepted, they will come up for ratification by the Canadian Parliament next session, after which a joint address of the Dominion and Columbia Legislatures will be sent to the Queen.
