Paris.—Gambetta arrived in Tours, from Paris on the 10th inst., and issued a proclamation relative to affairs in Paris, in which he says: The Revolution found Paris without guns or arms of any kind. Four hundred thousand of the National Guard are now armed, and one hundred thousand Mobiles and sixty thousand regulars are assembled. The foundries are casting cannon, and the women are making millions of cartridges daily. Each battalion of National Guards have two mitrailleuses and field pieces, and are preparing for sorties.
