The brunt of the attack was directed against our Totals \$17,254 18 \$18,991 06 \$21,352 89 DESTRUCTIVE FIRES .- About half-past 11 o'clock, on Friday night, a fire was discovered in the upper flat of the large four story building known as Fairbanks' Factory, Union street, and an alarm was given as soon as possible. The building was burned completely to the ground. A planing machine and some belting was saved, but apart from this the whole of the machinery, stock, etc., in the building were destroyed. The loss of Messrs, Fairbanks & Hawes in building and machinery is not less than \$14,000, and upon this they have only \$4,000 insurance. The third flat of the building was occupied by Mr. C. E. Burnham. His total loss is estimated at about \$4,000. No insurance. Mr. John Murphy occupied a portion of the upper flat as a brush manufactory. His tools and machinery, and stock, manufactured and unmanufactured, were worth probably between \$4,000 and \$5,000, and he had no insurance on any part of it. Mr. James Byers also occupied a portion of the building for wood turning, etc. All his lathes and tools were sides was very heavy, but the French claim a great lost. sons found employment in the different factories. This calamity is particularly trying to Messrs. Fairbanks & Hawes, who but two or three years ago had their old factory destroyed, with no insurance. They were just getting firmly on their feet again, and their business in every way flourishing. Another fire broke out about 2 o'clock on Saturday morning in the enamelling rooms at the Foundry of Mr. James Harris, and spread rapidly, destroying, before it could be subdued, four large buildings, and at one time threatening not only the main workshops of the foundry, but many of the dwelling houses on the streets adjoining. One of them was used as a wareroom for manufactured iron work, and as a pattern loft. All its contents were destroyed, including four new steam engines, about three hundred stoves, and a very large collection of patterns of different kinds of work, the accumulation of years, which it is impossible to replace, and the value of which can hardly be estimated; also five of the best quality enamelled mantle pieces. Another building was used as a stove fitting up and varnishing shop, and two new buildings on the side of the railway track were used for the manufacture of railway cars. In one of these there was a fine first class car just finished. It was run out clear of the building, but might almost as well have been destroyed, as it was terribly mutilated inside with axes by some parties in a foolish endeavour to "save the venetian blinds," while it is much burned on the outside. This car was insured for \$3,000. There was also a small amount of insurance on the buildings and contents, but it is very insignificant. Mr. Harris' loss will probably be \$25,000 or \$30,000. The insurance on all these properties was effected with Mr. Allison.
