ANCHOR LINE WHARF, REEF'S POINT.—The work of deepening the wharf on the side of this wharf by the dredge *New Dominion*, has been very satisfactorily completed. It is now from 12 to 15 feet deep, quite up to the angle of the wharf, at low water spring tides, with the rock bottom scraped clean and the sides almost as perpendicular as the wharf itself. The dredge has been removed to the end of the railway wharf at York Point Slip, and commenced work there on Wednesday afternoon.—H.

GREAT FIRE IN CALAIS.—Telegrams to the *Telegraph* and *Journal* of this City, dated Calais, Aug. 27th, say: The greatest conflagration ever known in this section of the country has been raging in this city since 2 o'clock.

It began on Church street, and was originated by children setting a fire in a shed in the rear of Rideau's livery stable. In ten minutes the stable and adjacent buildings were in flames.

The fire immediately spread in every direction. A strong wind blew the burning cinders down Main street and on shipping and lumber piles.

Twelve vessels have already been burned, and immense amounts of lumber and wharf property are destroyed.

Mr. Hill, H. F. Eaton, Eaton Bros., Todd & Boardman, E. Adams & Sons, Wadsworth & Kelly lose heavily in shipping, lumber, &c.

Twelve good dwelling houses were wholly consumed, many small tenement houses; also four blacksmith shops, five sawmills, the City and Provincial Yards, and the Masonic Hall; the *Calais Advertiser* office, with its outfit of type, and four presses, including a new power press; John Sears' job printing office.

St. Croix Hall, which included the city offices and the post office, was burned to the ground. Loss \$25,000.

Lumber piles and wharves continued to burn all night and Sunday morning. The fire was subdued. The firemen were on duty all night. Mayor Woodcock detailed fifty special policemen for the protection of goods and household effects saved from fire, yet vast quantities were stolen, portions of which were recovered Sunday morning.

A deep feeling of gloom pervades the city, and the streets are filled with crowds of sufferers and sympathizers. The churches were thinly attended on account of nearly everybody being exhausted from labor and excitement.

During the progress of the fire, the greatest panic prevailed, and several attempts were made to blow up buildings to stop the progress of the flames, but these failed. The lumber piles in St. Stephen took fire from the flying cinders several times, but were immediately extinguished.

About sixty families are homeless in consequence of the great fire. Steps are being taken by the city authorities to provide quarters for them.

More than one-third of the loss in lumber and shipping falls to residents of St. Stephen and Milltown, N. B.

When the Unitarian and Universalist Church was in peril, Charles Smith, of Milltown, Saint Stephen, climbed to the top of the steeple on ladders tied together, and with a hatchet split the burning ball beneath the weather vane, so that a breeze performed, while the crowd below watched with breathless anxiety, and it probably saved the church.

The Insurance Companies lose one hundred and sixty thousand dollars.

In addition to the dwelling houses burnt, there was fearful destruction made with vessels; some in port, and others on the stocks, with wharves, lumber, &c.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—It is now certain there was no serious fighting on Thursday, as reported. A Carlsruhe dispatch says there was a severe artillery battle at Kehl and Strasbourg Wednesday night, lasting until Thursday morning. A large part of the citadel and arsenal in Strasbourg were destroyed.

Many fire occurred in the city on account of the various bombardments.

A French battery located at Marivan was captured without loss to the Prussians.

The French fire has destroyed about twenty houses in Kehl.

A fourth army, under the Prince Royal of Saxony, is forming, to co-operate with the third army in the movement of Paris.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The Prince Royal of Prussia has issued a proclamation to the people of France, wherein he says: "Prussia makes war against the Emperor and not against the people of France. The people have nothing whatever to fear."

The Prince announces his purpose to instantly restore the lines of travel which have been interrupted or destroyed by army movements, so that labor and commerce may not be seriously hampered.

All the French officials have been requested to remain at their posts, and their personal safety will be guaranteed.

The Prince further says that the only surplus force that will be taken out of German troops will be that only which is not required by the peaceful French.

Two thousand vagrants having no visible means of support, and of a class likely to disturb the peace of the city, were arrested and taken to the fortifications, where they will be put upon the fortifications or be expelled from the city.

Every married man between the ages of 25 and 35, is to be mustered into the service.

Every officer under 70 years of age is to be recruited to duty in the field.

The Emperor accompanies Marshal McMahon who is on his retreat by the way of Vouziers.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—It was announced in the French Corps Legislatif Saturday that a Prussian force of 16,000 men had attacked the fortified town of Verdun and were repulsed with serious loss.

It was also reported that the Prussians have captured Vitry, together with sixteen guns and nearly one thousand prisoners.

The Prussian army advancing on Paris is moving steadily but not rapidly on, and its cavalry is making raids through all the country contiguous to the line of march.

There is a great activity in Paris in preparing for the expected siege, and the strife of factions appears to be more quiet in presence of the common peril.

and a feeling of confidence seems to animate the entire force. The different Associations is expected.

LONDON, August 29.—There are continued reports of a great battle on Sunday, but nothing in detail has been received.

Despatches indicate that the Crown Prince has halted in his advance on Paris, and is waiting for news of the issue of movements in the North, if he has not, with a portion of his army, set off in that direction.

A despatch dated Headquarters of the King of Prussia, on Monday, P. M., says:

"Yesterday was an action between the 3rd Regiment of Saxony Horse, supported by a squadron of the 18th Hussars, and six squadrons of French Chasseurs, near Sezanne. Our troops were victorious. The French commander was wounded and taken prisoner."

PARIS, August 29.—It is believed here to-night that a tremendous battle has been going on all day, as according to all accounts Marshal McMahon must have reached Prince Frederick Charles to-day.

A large number of field hands suddenly left Lanching, and just at the beginning of harvest. The circumstance excites fears that mischief is again brewing in Ireland.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Private despatches just received say that a great battle is going on.

"Eighty thousand men in progress for the last forty-eight hours, but the result is still uncertain. The engagement is believed to have covered miles of wooded ground between Stenay and Verdun."

The following from the French War Office is just received:

"There are nearly 900,000 men in the triangle formed by the lines running from Rheims to Reims and Vouziers. Bazaine is not shut up; he has 120,000 men, and McMahon is 180,000 strong. They are stealing two marches on the Prince Royal."

It is hoped that the latter cannot come up to meet them, as McMahon is not yet at Metz.

Fifty thousand men left Paris on Monday for the vicinity of Reims. It is said that the Prussian force there is 50,000.

Telegrams received from the city of Metz say that McMahon failed to form a junction with Bazaine, but that the wedge of the Prussians had been driven between the two armies. This wedge is now thicker than ever before, and McMahon has himself separated from Bazaine by two powerful German armies instead of one.

The twenty-seventh regiment of Chasseurs d'AFrique, commanded by the well known Marquis de Gaillet, attacked two regiments of Saxons Dragoons at Metz, and after a desperate fight, they were sharply defeated in utterly routing them with considerable loss.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.—Belgian troops are hastening to the frontier from all quarters. A great battle between the French and Prussian troops is apparently imminent, and the series of the Prussian troops will no doubt be necessary to protect the country from invasion.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—There is no confirmation of the great battle reported yesterday. The opposing armies are evidently maneuvering for position, and all accounts agree that a decisive battle in the north is imminent and cannot long be delayed.

All known newspaper correspondents are at once arrested, and movements in progress are kept secret. The Paris journals continue to be full of reports of the progress of the war.
