The only stoppages, except those common to newspapers generally, were a number who had not paid anything for a long time prior to the death of the former editor, and who did no better during the year of grace given them after his death. These we struck off, to our own profit,-and to theirs too, we think, for they were left with so much less encouragement to neglect. Yet our ef. forts to increase the list to any great extent have been vain. We have not toiled the less earnestly because of this however. We have hoped for more hearty co-operation on the part of those whose influence could aid us materially, but our hopes have not as yet been realized. A few of the ministers. and some of the laity also, have given the paper substantial aid. They have our heartfelt thanks. Others-the majority-have evidenced no interest whatever. It may be that some have looked upon it as a private enterprise, and concluded to let it take care of itself. It is a private enterprise, inasmuch as the responsibility, financially and otherwise, devolves entirely upon one indvidual; but it is a denominational enterprise, inasmuch as it is the acknowledged organ of the Free Baptist body. If was originated in their interest, and the idea of the originator has governed it always. If it were a money making speculation, everybody but the proprietor might well be indifferent concerning it; but those who are acquainted with the ins and outs of the business, know full well that there is no money in it. It does not even pay a salary to the editor.

We do not complain of the labour necessary to the preparation of its columns weekly. Though it is by no means light, we rather enjoy it; and the consciousness of doing something in the glorious work of disseminating the saving truth of the Gospel is a sufficient compensation for a great amount of severe toil. We have been, and expect to continue, trusting in the Lord Jehovah. The work is His. Thus far He has enabled us by His grace to endure. His is the glory.

We are anxious to have the INTELLIGENCER placed in every Free Baptist family. We believe they ought to have it, because it is the organ of the religious body with which they are identified.
