### STRONG IN HEART.

It might be an advantage to our language if we had a single word to express the idea contained in these three. We have one word, which expresses a corresponding idea in connection with the willthat is, head strong; but we have no such word as heart-strong. Perhaps cynics might say that this is because head-strong people are more numerous than those who are strong in heart; indeed, that the latter are so few, that it is seldom necessary to refer to them, and therefore a single word to express their peculiarity would be a useless addition to the language. We are not prepared, however to endorse any such sentiment. Those who are strong in heart are not so few in number as some might imagine. They are not so noisy and self-asserting as the head-strong, but they possess a quiet, unde monstrative power that gertly though surely moves the world. It is the heart-strong who neutralize the mischief of the head-strong. The latter, impulsive and self-willed, are frequently rash and inindicious; the former, calm and persistent, steadily move onward to the accomplishment of their pur DAMON.

Strength of heart in its highest manifestation implies renewal by the favor of God. Without this renewal, one may be headstrong by reason of a perverse will, but the characteristics which produce the best results in life will be wanting. The soul in such a state is like a vessel driven through the waves under heavy pressure of steam, but having no guiding hand at the helm to direct its course.
