Eloquent speeches have before now been made setting forth the "slavery of women" in Christendom The tireless round of dishwashing and bed-making, the humdrum monotony of kitchen work, the knitting, the seving, taking care of babies, cooking and waiting upon the men generally-all these figures are drawn upon the sombre picture of woman's servitude and woman's wrongs, and most eloquently set forth before the sympathizing sisterhood. It has touched a cord of sympathy, which goes trembling through the whole domain of disappointed hopes and prostituted ambition, awakening many a wail of eloquent woe. "Is there any slavery here ?" I said to my wife, ' any round of tedious servitude ?"


