The eighty cents per head will amount to twelve thousand dollars, -and, in addition to this, as an equivalent for public lands which are to be the property of the Dominion, an additional allowance of thirty thousand per annum for expenses of Local Government and Legislature; but a reserve of twelve hundred thousand acres is to be appropriated for extinguishing Indian titles, which still exist over the whole territory of Red River and Assiniboine lands now held in that country by settlers under various tenures, some by deed from the Hudson Bay

Company, some by occupancy. Bill proposes to confirm titles of all present occupants to land they hold in all territories of Rupert's Land not included in bounds of Manitabah, to be under the jurisdiction, in the meantime, of the Lieut. Governor of that Province, for the Pominion.

Arrangements have been made between Her Majesty's Government and the Government of the Dominion for a military expedition to restore and one-fourth British regulars and three-fourths Canadian Militia. Expenses in the same proportion. This arrangement was only finally agreed to by the British Government on Saturday, but it is probable that the force of regulars may be increased by 140 men, making 390 men in all.

The purchase money for the Territory has not yet been paid, but will be paid immediately to complete title before passing this Bill.

After Premier's exposition Mackenzie replied criticising the measure. He spoke of the absurdity of establishing fifteen thousand people as a province with two houses of parliament, and deprecated the expense entailed on the Dominion. Cartier followed briefly in English and French. McDougall replied charging the Government with a mistake in not paying over the purchase money for the Territory on 1st December. He said priests instigated the rebellion, and he could prove it if required. Hincks followed warmly defending the Government action in delaying payment and so securing the co-operation of the British Government in suppressing the disturbance.
