The Exporter of any duty paid goods to either of the said Colonies of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Islan I which Exporter must also be the original Importer, shall, if the value thereof amount to the sum of One Hundred Dollars, make and subscribe an Export Entry of the same before the Collector of Customs of the port from which the said goods are to be exported, in the usual form, stating the name, nationality and destination of the vessel, and the name and address of the consignee, with the des g nation, quantity and value of said goods, and the amount of duty originally paid thereon; and shall make and subscribe an affidavit, upon some convenient part of the said Entry, setting forth and affirming, that the goods as described in the said Entry are to be exported as stated in said Entry, and that the value assigned to the said goods, is the same as the value upon which said Exporter paid duty when the same were imported by him, to the Customs of the Dominion of Canada, and no more, which Entry shall be made and ubscribed in triplicate. One copy to be retained at the Custom House, one to be sent to the Department of Cusoms, Ottawa, and the remaining copy to be transmitted by the Exporter with the goods to the consignee, and on the return of the latter, with the certificate of the Collector of Customs, or otherwise duly authorized official, setting orth and testifying that the goods as described and valued in said Entry, have been duly received and entered at said port of destination, then it shall and may be lawful for e Collector of the port at which the said Export Entry had been made, to pay the amount of Drawback to the Exporter, taking his receipt therefor.
