ABOUT CANNING FRUIT.

THE PROCESS.—Everything should be in readiness, the jars clean, the covers well fitted, the fruit picked over or otherwise prepared, and cement and corks, if these are used, at hand. The bottles or jars are to receive a very hot liquid, and they warm water in them, to which boiling water is gradually added. Commence by making a syrup n the portion of a pound of white sugar to a pint of water, using less sugar if this quality will make syrup gradually, and when it comes to a boil, ladel it into the jars or bottles which have been warmed as above directed. Put in as much fruit as possible, Just at this moment the lady in question came and then add the syrup to fill up all the interstices the stopper as soon as possible. Have a cloth at the jars. 
