When the printer has an idea of a new pattern, he describes to the designer the stripe, check, flower, &c., and two or three months are necessary for preparing these

designs before filling orders. "One of the most novel patterns ever produced was by accident. Messrs. Simpson & Co. of Manchester Works, were printing a quantity of cloth in parallel stripes. As one piece was going upon the blanket, the next piece came in another shape on the other side, and cut across the pattern; so that the stripes being thrown angularly on each other, produced a new effect, which received the name of the diorama pattern. This became so great a favorite, that the printers sold 25,000 pieces of it in


