WATCH AND PRAY.

In the prayer taught the disciples by our Lord is the petition, "deliver us from evil," Like all the other teachings of Him who is the all-wise, it is strikingly suggestive. It implies the idea of future danger, and is a cry for help and deliverance. The man who understands himself, who rightly thinks and feels, is not satisfied with the supply of his present necessities, is not content with pardon of his past sins, but will be anxious about the future, and earnestly desirous of preserving his integrity and uprightness. Who is there with any experience that will not give some thought to that part of the path of life yet unknown and untrodden ? And who, knowing that dangers will beset and foes assail, that will not be constrained to cry, "deliver me from evil ?" Those who know Christ and His love, and hence know what an evil sin is, how abhorrent it is in God's sight, and what dire consequences are visited upon those who indulge in it, are anxious to avoid it. They also have learned that they are in constant danger of being led astray, and knowing how weak they are in themselves to resist the power of sin, the great necessity of the prayer appears clear to them. They know that tempters to sin will be no less numerous in the future than they have been in the past, hence there will be no less need of divine help to meet and successfully contend with them. Satan is always busy adapt his temptations to every peculiarity of temperament, condition and character, make him a bidding of the adversary of souls, and are often his most successful emissaries in the work of ruin. The Saviour also taught that a man's foes would often be they of his own household; and it is frequently the case that temptations to sin come from those who are esteemed our best friends ; sometimes from the people of God, as well as from those who we consider his and our enemies. The devil would always prefer using a supposed friend rather than a known foe, or a christian rather than a man of the world. In ways without number too, and by the use of things in themselves not evil, we are tempted to sin and ruin. Then there are foes within, as well as without. If this were not the case there need not be much to fear. But with hearts full of evil propensities, all acting in concert with the foes without, the peril is imminent. One traitor within the camp is worse than a score outside. Ten thousand rebels inside of Paris, would have been worse than a hundred thousand Germans surrounding the city, and if they were acting in concert the resistance of the city would have to be of short duration. So with hosts of tempters besieging us, and hosts of temptible elements within us, the fearful dangers which beset us and lurk about our feet, can scarcely be told. They are enough to make us offer constantly the prayer "deliver us from evil." If prayer is restrained, the enemy will surely overcome us, and lead us away captive at his will, But is it enough to simply pray against temptation ?
