1. That Schools conducted under the Act relating to Parish Schools, will close with repeal of said Act on December 31, 1871; and that Returns of the same are made to this Office on December 30th. 2. That the Act relating to Common Schools comes into operation on January 1, 1872; and that District School Meetings are to be hold on January

3. That, for purposes of administration connected with the Act relating to Common Schools, the Board of Education has prescribed:

(1) That the School year be divided into two School Terms: the first Term beginning November 1st, and closing on April 30th; the second Term begining on May 1st, and closing on October 31st.

(2) That the first Term under the operation of Act, begin on January 15, 1872, and close on April 30, 1872. (3) That the Provincial Training School hold two

Sessions in each School Year (instead of four as hitherto): the first session beginning on the first Wednesday of November; the second Session, on the first Wednesday of May. (4) That the first Session of the Training School

under the operation of the Act, begin on January 15, 1872, and close on April 15, 1872, at 9 o'clock, A. M.

5. That all Regulations made by the Board of Education under the authority of the Act relating to Common Schools are now in course of publication, and will shortly be distributed for the information of the people generally.
