HERBIE FISHING.—The St. Andrews Standard has had a harvest for the last few days. The Bay has been swarming with herring, and on Monday night nearly two hundred were seen, which are being taken from fifteen to twenty barrels to each net; they were large and fat. The Bay is alive with fish and "only wait to be caught" as an old resident observed.

OTTAWA, March 27.—The Committee on Public Accounts sat on Friday and this morning.

Several Intercolonial Railway swindles have been unearthed.

Land in the vicinity of Petty Hamlet, N. B., has been sold for \$200 per acre.

Tenders for locomotives received from various large firms. The Yorkshire Engine Company, largest locomotive manufacturers in the world, tendered for the whole of them at \$11,575 each. New Jersey tendered for the same at \$11,500 each; yet all these have been passed over, and the contract given to Kingston Company, in which one Commissioner has interest, and a Halifax firm. The only extension given was an outlet, that all the tenders refused were too low to produce good work. Afterwards the excuse given by Mr. Walsh for rejecting the tenders of the English and American firms was that of a desire to encourage home manufacture; but in the face of the fact that the Canadian tenders were passed over, the Committee is still sitting. Mr. Blanchett has given notice that he will move for employment of reporters to take verbatim reports of Parliamentary proceedings, similar to Congressional reports at Washington.

The Canal Commissioners' Report, containing some 300 pages with maps, was laid before Parliament.

Among the works of first class, which should be undertaken as fast as possible, are the disposal of the Government waste, the Sanitization of the Welland Canal, the Ottawa Canal improvements, from the capital to Lake Huron, and the enlargement of the Hamilton Canal, the construction of the Erie Canal, the enlargement of the locks of the St. Lawrence Canal, the same scale as the Welland Canal, namely: 270 feet long, 45 feet wide and 12 feet draught, the improvement of the Channel between Montreal and Quebec and of Montreal harbor.

The locks of the Bay Verte are 270 feet long, 40 feet wide and 15 feet draught. Letters are appended from Samuel Keefe and Gwyski, both eminent engineers, showing the feasibility of the latter work, which is considered national in design and certain to be national in its result. The cost of the works recommended is put to over nine millions of dollars.

The Commissioners show that the improvement of the Canada water control the Western trade and stimulate Intercolonial commerce.

The whole report is an elaborate exposition of the commercial development of the Dominion and Western States.

The adjourned debate on Mr. Blake's motion relative to the Montreal Act was resumed.

Mr. Blake said in view of the subsequent action of the Government since the matter was before the House, if the Minister of Militia would withdraw his amendment Mr. Dorion would also withdraw his, and his, Blake's original resolution, would be carried without opposition, as Mr. Dorion had admitted the principle they contained to be correct.

The vote was taken on Mr. Dorion's motion, when it was lost; yeas, 55; nays, 77.

Sir G. E. Cartier's motion was carried; yeas, 78; nays, 57.

Mr. Anglin, as a representative of one of the smaller Provinces protested against the course of the Government.

OTTAWA, March 28.—After recess last night Mr. Anglin resumed the debate on Mr. Blake's motion, as amended by resolution of Sir Geo. E. Cartier. Mr. Anglin, in a forcible and eloquent speech, presented a strong case against the amendment, and without the assent of the House being first obtained.

Mr. Holton moved that the resolutions be amended by adding the following, "and this House is of the opinion that no change in the provisions of the Act of the North American Act should be made by the Executive Government without the previous assent of the Parliament of the Dominion."

Sir George E. Cartier said the Government had no objection to accepting the amendment.

The amended motion was then carried; yeas, 99; nays, 28.

Mr. Blake moved the second reading of the Act securing the independence of the Senate. The object of the Bill was declared to be that no Senator should be eligible for any other employment in the Government. He did not propose to amend the constitution, but to guard in the most careful manner the independence of the Upper House.

The motion was lost; yeas, 57; nays, 58.

Sir Geo. E. Cartier moved that the House go into Committee on resolution, "That the Government of the Dominion of Canada, in the name of the Dominion of Canada, in a speech occurring over an hour in delivery. He laid the scheme before the House, the Bill was in nature a treaty, and consequently the Government would insist upon the adoption of those terms, as adopted in British Columbia, and would object to any paragraph in the Bill, would defeat the whole project. The debate was continued until midnight of the 29th, when it was again adjourned.

OTTAWA, March 29.—In the House of Commons today, Mr. Donald Smith, a member for Selkirk, Manitoba, was introduced to the House, and took his seat behind the Hon. Mr. Tupper.

Mr. Mackenzie called attention to the fact that Mr. Smith took his seat under an Act, the constitutionality of which was being sought for at the hands of the Imperial Parliament. The Opposition, after this notification, devoted themselves of all further responsibility.

Sir G. E. Cartier replied that Mr. Smith took his seat under an Act of the Canadian Parliament, sanctioned by the Imperial authorities, and until that Act should be disallowed or declared illegal, the Government could not refuse him a seat in the House.

Sir F. Hincks moved concurrence in the report of the Committee of Supply on the item of two hundred thousand dollars to provide for the erection of a Custom House and Post Office at Halifax.

Mr. Dorian moved that the Government should not Nova Scotia, having recently erected suitable buildings, it is inexpedient to appropriate money for the erection of others for the same purpose till some other attempt was made to effect an arrangement for the fifty thousand dollars necessary to secure possession of the present building from the Government of Nova Scotia.

Sir G. E. Cartier moved an amendment to Mr. Dorian's motion, that the resolution be referred back to the Committee of Supply for the purpose of inserting a proviso for the payment of the amount if exceeding \$50,000, as should be ordered by arbitration to the Government of Nova Scotia in case the new buildings are made available for the purpose. (Opposition cheers.)

Mr. Dorian proposed an amendment, which he said was even more to his mind than his own motion.

Mr. Holton gave notice that unless the Government would give a satisfactory statement he would move the following amendment to the amended motion: "Provided that no portion of the said two hundred thousand dollars be expended until the result of the proposed arbitration be ascertained."

Sir F. Hincks replied that it would not be expedient unless Nova Scotia refused to submit to arbitration.

On the item for Canada a discussion arose. Mr. Mackenzie regretted that the Government had made no provision for the immediate construction of Sault Ste. Marie Canal.

Sir F. Hincks said the work presented great engineering difficulties.

Mr. Langevin said the survey of the Bay Verte Canal had not been completed, and the Government could form no estimate of the cost, but the importance of the work was kept in view, and next session that Government would be prepared to ask the House for an appropriation for its construction.

Forrester, the alleged murderer of Mr. Nathan, was arrested in Louisville, Ky., for robbery, last November, and is still in the York County, keeping a few sheep and skinning out his income by levies on the pockets of travelers. These are all reports from reliable sources.

The Montreal Passenger Railway Company have been condemned to pay \$20 and \$60 costs for having refused to receive three English pennies as legal tender of fare, from Mr. Dufranc, and for having turned him out of their cars.

He gives his body after his death to Prof. Agassiz and Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, to be placed in the museum at Cambridge, but directs that two drum-heads shall be made of his skin, on which "Yankee Doodle" shall be beaten, at the base of Bunker Hill Monument, annually, at sunrise on the 17th of June.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, March 24.—In the House of Lords the policy of the British Government towards China was denounced by Earl Grey and the Duke of Somerset.

In the Commons Mr. Gladstone said there was no intention of the Government to prosecute speakers of treasonable language at recent Republican meetings held in London; also that Government was disposed to press claims against France for property of British subjects destroyed.

Messrs. Dixon, Mundell and John Bright eloquently opposed the New Army Bill, but the Government was sustained by a majority of 204.

LONDON, March 25.—The National Assembly at Versailles has received communication from the Mayor of Paris asking that before the horrors of civil war are inaugurated in Paris, that the Assembly enter into communication with the Mayors and give them full powers.

The withdrawal of the German troops from France has been entirely stopped.
