THE FESTAL SPEECHES.—The Boston Journal of Monday says: - The speeches and sentiment were in excellent taste and couched in eloquent language. The President's remarks were brief, of course, yet pertinent. Lord Lisgar was polished in phrase and courteous in manner. Gov. Wilmot was thrillingly eloquent. He took the vast audience captive. It wept and laughed alternately. Governor Perham spoke handsomely for Maine, as he did subsequently at Vanceboro'. Secretaries Belknap. Bobeson, and Creswell nobly sustained the credit of America. Mr. Creswell at Vanceboro' bore of first honors, as did Gov. Wilmot at Bangor. Among all the speakers of both nationalities there was a spirit of chivalrous concession, a purpose not to be outdone in courtesy. The result was perfect concord of feeling and the establishment of an under standing which will render almost impossible the reproduction of the old spirit of ungenerous rival ry and national bigotry.
