Soldiers, conscious and unbending in their uniforms are always in view, and the dark faces of gypsies, Tartars, Persians and Jews are a pleasant relief after the fair nonopoly of the average Russian. Why is it that the men of the Sclavonic family are so much comelier than the women? Handsome men abound, and doubtless there are lovely, graceful women here, though they are rarely visible in church, or street, or bazaar.

Bear patiently the childish humors of the little ones. They are but the untutored pleadings of the young spirit for care and cultivation. Irritated into strength and hardened into habits, they will haunt the whole of life like fiends of despair, and make your little ones to curse the day they were born ; but corrected kindly and patiently, they become the elements of happiness and usefulness.
