BREVITIES.—Robt. A. Chapman, Esq., is spoken of as a candidate for the vacant seat in Westminster. He is said to be a thorough temperance man.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Governor Washburn, of Massachusetts, in his inaugural message delivered to-day, has inaugurated the adoption of the prohibitory liquor law.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Arrangements have been made for the introduction of American cars on the English railways.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—James Fisk, Jr., was shot early on Saturday evening on the stair case of the Grand Central Hotel by Edward S. Stokes, with whom he was involved in bitter lawsuit.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The inhabitants of Brattleboro and adjoining towns in Vermont gathered in large numbers to-day at the funeral of Colonel Fisk.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—In New Orleans yesterday, Whelward Warrmouth, a member of the State assembly, was fatally shot while interfering in the arrest of another member by the Sergeant-at-Arms of Carter.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Ship Spirit of the Dawn, which sailed this week from Liverpool for San Francisco, was driven on the rocks off Holyhead during the gale of yesterday, and became a total wreck.

Sir Francis Crosby, of Halifax, member of Parliament for Yorkshire, died yesterday, aged 53.

The London Echo rejoices at the removal of Minister Catarazy from Washington, because he has endeavored to disturb the peaceful relations of the United States and Great Britain.

Joseph Gillott, the steel manufacturer, is dead.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The London Geographical Society, in consequence of the refusal of the Government to aid it, has appealed to the public to assist in the search for Dr. Livingston.

The French Assembly was excited on Saturday over the reading of a large number of petitions for the restoration of the monarchy.

London, Jan. 9.—All the city journals have articles on the assassination of Fiske, and condemn the laxity of public sentiment, and the weakness of the Courts, in tolerating the carrying of concealed weapons.

Lord Stanley, in an address to the Liverpool workmen, this evening, said the old liberal programme was exhausted. He expected, in future, that Conservatism would predominate in all new projects.

The Queen and family have gone to Osborne.

The German Ambassador presented his credentials to Thiers to-day. He reiterated expressions of friendship for France.

The French minister to Germany, telegraphs he will shortly receive from Bismarck. Almost every city in Italy is infected with small pox.

The captain of the ship Windsor Castle, which ran down the vessel in the channel, and was reported to have passed on without heeding the cries of the drowning mariners, has been examined, and acquitted of all blame.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Heavy snow has blocked the portions of the Union Pacific Railroad, greatly impeding travel, and in some instances passengers on delayed trains suffered from hunger.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The body of Fisk lay in state in grand hall of Erie railway office, up to one o'clock, when the Episcopal service was read by Chaplain Flagg of 9th Regt.
