In New England, these statistics have in some cases received considerable attention, and the able writer who furnishes the accompanying paper has drawn the following conclusions: At least 80 per cent of the crime of New Eng-

From 3 to 7 per cent. of the population of the United States commit 30 per cent of all our crime, and less than one- | them. fifth of one per cent. is committed by those who are educated.

2. As in New England, so throughout all the country, from 80 to 90 per cent. have never learned any trade or mastered any skilled labor; which bears the same ratio to freedom from crime as education in schools.

3. Not far from 75 per cent, of New England crime is committed by persons of foreign extraction. Therefore, 20 per cent. of the population furnishes an "immigrant coming hither with education, either in schools or labor, does not betake himself to crime."

4. From 80 to 90 per cent. of our criminals connect their career of crime with intemperance. 5. In all juvenile reformatories, 95 per cent. of the offenders come from idle, ignorant, vicious homes. Almost all children are truant from school children of ignorant parents. These children furnish the future inmates of our prisons; "for criminals are not made in some malign hour; they grew.' In the face of these facts, what can be said but this: "Ignorance breeds crime; education is the remedy for the crime that imperils us."
