Mr. Holton objected to the item of \$49,000 for enrolment, considering it unnecessary, and thought that five hundred thousand ought to cover the entire militia expenditure this year after ratification of the treaty.

Mr. McKenzie objected to twelve months artillery training, and he advocated six months' tuition The present militia system was one of expediency, maintained by the patriotism of the people only. The reports of the Adjutant General showed that it would soon be necessary to resort to the ballot

Sir G. E. Cartier denied that volunteering was growing less popular. In the cities selfish employers discouraged the movement, and it might be advisable to adopt the ballot system, but in the rural districts there was no lack of volunteers.

Mr. Anglin wishes to know why the baracks and grounds at St John were retained by the Imperial Government, while important fortifications at Quebec had been handed over to the Dominion. Sir Geo. E. Cartier replied that correspondence was in progress with the Imperial authorities on the subject of transferring property.
