Accuracy should be considered a cardinal virtue; it necessarily involves being specific. Learn to reduce all your statements as far as practicable, to facts, figures, and forms. State a fact just as you saw it, without comment; if you learned it from another, say nothing positively. Give the exact numbers whenever you can, and in describing a thing put it on paper, if possible.
