





At the inquest, Dr. Foster McFarlane, who had been summoned to the scene of disaster, deposed as follows in reference to Murray :---

On examination I found rigor mortis well marked. The covering of the bowels was torn off in the lower portion of the abdomen and all the intestines protruded. The left thigh was broken in and muscles. The right leg was completely cut asunder about the middle of the thigh and the body also had evidences of scalding either by steam or water. Such injuries as those received by deceased would cause death in a short time. In reference to Sheehan, the Doctor's evidence was as follows :---

Rigor mortis was well marked. The right leg. at the junction of the lower and middle third of the femer was entirely severed, the pelvis broken, and the abdominal cavity torn off. The face and hands and parts exposed were denuded of the skin, with appearances of having been scalded. The injuries would cause death almost instanatneously.


