Men counted the meteors that traversed small portions of the sky, and from these numbers estimated that more than two hundred thousand were visible at a single station, during that night.

Humboldt remembered that he saw a similar shower of stars, in South America, in 1799. Then, from one source and another, information was gathered of no less than twelve such great November showers, and it appeared that they happened at regular intervals of about thirty three and one fourth years. When the period returned again, in 1866, a good look out was kept for the great star-shower. It was not such in America, -at least the meteors were not very plenty-but there was a beautiful display for those who watched in Europe. You see that these shows are distributed so that all parts of the world can have a view. Seriously, the stars are visible only at that part of the earth which is turned toward the part of the heavens in which they fly,and a few hours sooner or later makes the difference between seeing them in Europe or in America.

It sometimes happens that two persons who are watching at some distance from each other, are able to agree that they have seen the same star, and have noted the place of its flight. Then they can compute with considerable certainty, its height, the length of its visible path, and its rate of motion. Comparing such observations, it is learned that the meteors are first seen when about eighty miles from the earth; they vanish when about fifty miles high; the average length of thenr visible flight is fortytwo miles; and their usual speed about twenty-nine

Whenever the shooting-stars are abundant, they seem to come from some one point in the sky. In the November showers we find that they all came from a comparatively small place in the sky, in the constellation LEO; they seemed to radiate from that point, which was, therefore, called the RADI-ANT of that shower. About the 10th of August, in each year, a larger number of meteors than usual may be seen; their radiant is in the group called

From the facts stated above we learn several other things about these stars. In the first place they come from beyond either the earth or its atmosphere. If they started from some place in the air, that point would move as the earth rotates on its axis, and therefore would seem to change its place with reference to the stars.

Where then, can they come from-the mod But if they were thrown from the moon, and fell directly to the earth they could not move so fast as twenty nine miles in a second, and besides this, would seem to come from the moon, or at least, their paths could be traced to the moon,

The fact of their rate of motion determined their nature at once, for all astronomers. There are no bodies in the solar system which travel at such a speed except those that revolve about the sun. The meteors must be small objects that revolve about the sun, just as the earth. Jupiter, and all the planets, revolve in their orbits. And why not? A single particle must obey the laws of gravitation and of motion as well as an aggregate of millions. The millions move together only because each one for itself obeys the forces of attraction, and each one will obey when alone, just as certainly as in the mass. The atoms in the universe are not like children, who sometimes stop to consider if it is best to mind or not; the force says "come," and each comes without delay.

This rate of motion tells still more. It shows the shape of the orbit in which the meteors move, and the distance at which they are nearest and farthest from the sun. The November meteors come about as near the sun as our earth, and when farthest grow upon us by use. We must be courteous, away they are near the path of the planet Uranus, that is, about eighteen hundred millions of miles

It is believed that these meteors traverse this orbit in about thirty-three years. That there is a long and broad stream or procession of them, so long that they are three or four years in passing a single point in their orbit, just as a large procession of men may be several hours in passing the place where you

The stream of meteors moves in a direction opposite to that of the earth, and so, when the earth | dee 22

gets to a certain place in its path, on the 12th of November, it meets this procession, and the stars are abundant, flying in all directions as the earth goes through them, some turning by one side, some by another, but all seeming to come from the point in Leo. But the stream is so long that when the earth, a year later, comes back to the same place in its path, the meteors are still passing, and even on the third year the last have not gone by. Then in thirty-three years more the procession will come round again, and the whole series of appearances will be repeated.

The August meteors have a longer orbit, and a longer period; but instead of collecting in a vast crowd, they seem to be distributed all along their path, so that the earth meets some every year.

And then besides these large streams, the whole space of the solar system appears to be full of these little bodies, just as in a summer evening, you may look up into the air and see it filled with myriads of minute insects, which way so ever you look.

Ordinarily, when flying through space, the meteors are so small that they do not gather enough sunlight to make them visible. When they come into our air, moving, as they do, so very swiftly, about ten miles in a second faster than the earth itself, the friction against our air, and its resistance to their motion, heats them red-hot, and they are consumed in the oxygen of the air.
