CHILDREN'S GIFTS.

The gain of children's giving, in the influence upon all, is well treated in the following extract from the Sunday School World:

No community is so poor that its children are unable to have a part in missionary giving; nor is any so rich that its children can afford to live without such a giving. Those who give-rich or poor -have a blessing they could not otherwise know. All are entitled to strive for this blessing. It is a wrong against any people to deny them the benefits of being givers, as well as receivers in God's service. The missionaries of the American Sunday School Union have found, by long and varied experience, that any Sunday school is more likely to stand and prosper if the people for whom it is formed contrabute for its support. It is no advantage to a school to be fully supplied with books and other requisites by outside donations. Even though the people are very poor, and must pinch themselves sorely to furnish means to start the school, the missionary feels that he is doing them and the school good, enlarging their hearts and bringing friends to the school, when he induces them to give something for the purpose of a library and for the further aid of the new undertaking. So in our earliest communities: the best managed mission schools in our cities have learned the value of missionary collecttions from the poor children they are formed to benefit, even when these schools and their scholars are dependant on charity for their support. It was not after God's people had accumulated a surplus stock of this world's goods that they were called to give; but it was the firstlings of their herds and of their flocks, and the first fruits of their land and of their labour, that they were commanded to offer to God as His portion. And it was when a poor widow " of her want did cast in all she had" to the Lord's treasury, that Jesus commended her example to His disciples, with no word of censure for her seeming imprudence. The duty and the blessings of giving are for the poor as well as for the rich, and all alike find that in the Lord's cause "there is that scattereth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty." Father Paxson, of Missouri, tells the story of a visit he made to a mission school connected with the Home for the Friendless in New York city, where some sixty children raised their hands in answer to the teacher's inquiry, as to who had yet eaten nothing that day-at 11 o'clock in the morning-and where bread was brought in to feed the hungry ones. He was impressed with the evident poverty there; but as he told the school of his western missionary work he was still more surto earn something to aid him in his work of starting new Sunday schools. From that mission school he afterwards received more than thirty dollars, which had been earned and saved by willing little ones, and the suprientendent said, on forwarding it to him, that if it never did any good in his field the mere raising it had proved a blessing to the scholars. There is good ground for the opinion of Rev. Dr. Curry, who has said that he would take up a collection in every Sunday school every Sunday, even if he emptied the money into the gutter at the close of the school, because of the benefit that comes to scholars and teachers from giving.

To get the benefit of such giving, scholars must give what costs them something. Their offerings must be the result of their personal labor or sacrifice. A child who asks his father or his mother for one cent, or ten cents, for the missionary box, each Sunday, and receives the desired amount as a gift from his parent, is not benefited by his giving. Indeed, he has not given anything, but is, perhaps, harmed by thinking he has done a generous act. His parents might well help him to earn something -paying him for some special service or self-denial which he has undertaken to secure money for the Sunday school mission work; or he could earn something outside of his home for such giving. There are church and mission schools which receive into the mission box money thus carned or saved by the scholars, requiring a statement from each scholar as to the source of his contribution, Such

schools are training scholars in a habit of liberality. Of course, it is not missionary giving when scholars contribute money for the running expences of the Sunday school; turnishing means to purchase singing and library books, papers, questionbooks, and other school necessaries or luxuries. As

well might a householder claim credit as a liberal giver because he supplied abundantly his own table; bought music for his daughter and books for his library; and subscribed to attractive family newspapers. There may, to be sure, be cases where all are interested in forming a Sunday school, young and old in a poor community, must contribute for its first supply; and in so doing the givers will be the gainers by their donations for the general good; but when a school is fairly under way, it should be supported by other funds than the children's. At all events the children should know that what they give for their own benefit is no missionary giving; and they should be called to give to outside charities, that they may do their duty in such giving, and reap its benefits in their personal cha-

FARMING AS A BUSINESS .- A man who is not smart enough to run a store is not smart enough to farm. Farmers are not to be made of what is left after lawyers, doctors, ministers and merchants are picked out; and if a man fails on a farm, it is not unlikely he will succeed in a store, for it requires more talent to be a thriving farmer than to be an average merchant. The one great cause of failure is the disproportion between a man's farm and his capital. A farmer's capital is skill, labour and his money. If he has little cash, he must have no more land than he can thoroughly manage by his own personal labour. Every acre beyond this is an incumbrance; one acre well worked is more profitable than twenty acres skimmed over. It is the greed of land by farmers that have not the capital to keep it, that keeps so many poor. Small farms are better than large ones, simply because they are better suited to the capital of common farmers. Large farms with large capital are better than small ones. Farming is a good business for all men who conduct it on proper principles, and have capital according to the size of their farms, and a bad one for everybody else. - Farmer and Artisan.


