WATCHMAKING IN SWITZERLAND. [From the Swiss Times of May 3 th.]

E have already drawn attention to the annual meeting of the Society of Arts, heid on the 23rd current, under the presidentship of M. Th. de Saussure, and are now able to furnish some further details.

Professor Soret, in delivering a most interesting report, passed in review the operations of the Industrial section. reference to Commerce, laying great stress upon the ompetition that has taken place in the manufacture of chronometers. This competition was instituted with the object of testing the workmanship and precision of chroometers turned out by Genevese manufacturers, and none out those adopted for pocket use were admitted. They were deposited in charge of the authorities at the Observaory, and underwent the most searching ordeal possible to be applied to pocket instruments of this class. The jury specially retained to decide the difficult question as to yhom to award the palm of excellence unanimously deided in favor of Messrs. J. M. Badollet & Co.
