#### ALLIGATORS' NESTS.

The female of these huge lizards selects a spot of dry ground when she wishes to make her nest. This is usually where there is long, coarse grass, near the water's edge. She then spreads a compost several inches in thickness, over the spot selected. It is a mixture of mud, leaves, grass, and stalks of plants. On this she deposits a layer of eggs, and covers them with compost. Then a second layer of eggs is spread over the mass of leaves, which are also covered with more compost. And this process goes on until the reptile has no more eggs to de-

The heat of the sun does the hatching, and saves the mother the trouble. She, however, is by no means indifferent to her offspring, but watches the nest with jealous care. Sometimes over a hundred eggs are found in an alligator's nest; whether all of them are the product of one female is a question. During the breeding season the old ones are exceedingly savage, especially in the neighborhood of their nests .- Youth's Companion.
