At the end of the sandy beach, a narrow promontory extended one hundred feet into the sea, in the centre of which was a gothic arch, sufficiently large to admit our whale-boat. Beyond was a triple-archway the largest arch facing the sea, the others being parallel to the coast, and as neatly cut as if the work of a master-builder. "The waters wear the stone" is true now as in the days of Job. All along that ancient shore, the tireless waves had excavated deep, dark caves, which echoed the thunder of the mighty deep. By the action of wind and wave, immense rocks had fallen from above and mingled with granite boulders borne thither by icebergs-those transports of the Arctic sea. Opposite the shore stood a slender, lofty rock, like a column of renown, and near it was Giant's Causeway in miniature. A hundred yards from the coast it was a mountain of basaltic rocks of columnar shape, each one six inches square, and from six to ten feet long, lying in regular rows like bars of iron. Far up on the face of the cliffs were the nests of the eider-duck, while on calm waters, the barren islands, the floating ice-bergs, and on the wing in the summer air, were myriads of those beautiful creatures. At intervals, along the high, black cliffs, were cascades from the melted snows of the distant glacier which came laughing and dancing down the rocks—the wind spreading out the spray brilliant with the rainbow.
