

## ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

**LONDON, Jan. 1.**—The revenue receipts of Great Britain, for the quarter ending December 31st, amounted to \$73,000,000, an increase of five millions over the preceding quarter.

It is rumored that the large Russian loan will soon be put in the market.

**LONDON, Jan. 2.**—The Russian Government has communicated to Great Britain its plans for a campaign in Central Asia, and offered to allow British troops to accompany the Russian troops.

Handfuls of agricultural laborers are out of employment here because the farmers refuse to pay the wages they demand. They are preparing to emigrate to Brazil.

The Portuguese Cortes was opened to-day by King Louis in person.

**LONDON, Jan. 3.**—London Times of this morning on death of Kamehameha says: It must be confessed Americans will eventually people the Sandwich Islands which will become a valuable colony between San Francisco, China and Australia. It doubts the propriety of any nation taking possession of Sandwich Islands by filibustering.

**PARIS, Jan. 1.**—At Versailles Thiers held the usual New Year's reception. The diplomatic body was first received. No speeches were made.

**PARIS, Jan. 2.**—The Carotiz is making favorable progress toward recovery. His fever is gradually decreasing.

**ROME, Jan. 2.**—The Pope on receiving the Palatine Guard yesterday morning, addressing the troops, declared that the city of Rome was dancing on perilous ground.

**LONDON, Jan. 2.**—John F. Hawson & Co., of this city, dealers in Manchester goods, have failed. Their liabilities are reported at \$15,000,000. Other failures will follow in consequence.

The weather to-day is tempestuous and some damage has been reported to shipping.

The ships *Northumberland*, *Hercules* and *Sutton*, of the recent service, were somewhat damaged by the recent severe gales.

The Ex-Emperor Napoleon had an operation successfully performed upon him yesterday for the removal of a stone in his bladder; up to this afternoon the symptoms of the patient were favorable.

**LONDON, Jan. 4.**—Correspondence has taken place between Von Bismarck and the Duke of Gramont, in relation to the assertion of the latter that Austria promised to assist France in case of a war with Prussia. Von Bismarck denies the intention of actually publishing in Paris a reply, explaining the attitude of Austria at the time of the outbreak of the late war.

Bismarck will return to Paris from Rome. This is regarded as an indication of a continuance of a difference between Thiers and the Pope.

Count Von Arnim will entertain President Thiers and a number of other distinguished personages at a dinner to-morrow.

**LONDON, Jan. 6.**—Napoleon underwent a second operation at noon to-day. The Emperor suffered much, but rather from constitutional disturbance than from the effects of the operation. The results are not unfavorable.

The British Government declines to support the proposal of the Royal Geographical Society for sending out an Arctic Expedition partially at the public expense.

The new Commercial Treaty between France and England have been signed by the representatives of both Governments.

The Greek Government on the recommendation of the great powers, has consented to submit the question of the Laurium Mines to arbitration.

The German ministry have settled the provisions of a bill which regulates the authority of a superior over inferior clergy, controls the training of the latter, and sets up rules governing ecclesiastical appointments.

Seven thousand Carlists are concentrated in the Province of Olat, and will enter on a vigorous campaign.

Don Alphonse entered Catalonia on Saturday night.

A deputation of Irish Catholics on Monday presented the Pope with the Pope's Pence. The Pope congratulated the Irish on the preservation of their faith and gave the Apostolic blessing to Ireland.

**PARIS, Jan. 7.**—Thiers and a sub-committee of the Committee of 300 agreed as to occasions when the President may personally address Assembly.

M. Corbelle is still in Rome.

The Minister of public instruction will give rise to discussions in Assembly.

Notice was given of interpellations regarding resignation of Ambassador to Holy See.

An undisciplined brigadier was shot on Isle of Wight on Monday, and went to pieces. Nine persons were drowned.

A despatch from Chiselhurst this afternoon states there is no change in ex-Emperor's case. Local symptoms are severe, but the patient's strength shows no signs of improvement.

British ship "Derby," with a cargo of cotton from Mobile to Cork, is ashore at Tortugas, not killed.

**LONDON, Jan. 8.**—A despatch from Chiselhurst at 3 o'clock this afternoon states Napoleon is worse.

It is reported that a meeting of Bonapartists is to be held at Chiselhurst for the purpose of deliberating on the course to be pursued in the event of the death of the ex-Emperor.

With Sir Charles Dilke was delivering an address on the subject of "Land and People" in Derby last night, a mob attacked the meeting and attempted to disperse it. The adherents of Sir Charles resisted the assault, and a severe struggle ensued. Several persons were injured and many windows broken.

Sticks and bludgeons were used by the mob against the speaker and his wife to their hotel.

## UNITED STATES.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 1.**—British schooner *Levin*, from Cape Haytian for Boston, put into Newport, and her sails and main boom were lost of logwood.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 2.**—The Fifth Avenue theatre was burned yesterday afternoon. A portion of the Fifth Avenue Hotel was broken in and two private streets, demolished by the fall of the theatre walls.

No lives were lost by the burning of the theatre.

There were fires also on Broadway, loss \$40,000, and on Church street, loss \$17,000.

The ship "Pomona," from Liverpool, reports the landing at Fayal of the Captain and crew of the barque "David Cannon," from Miranich for London, waterlogged on Nov. 20th.

The testimony introduced to-day on the trial of Stokes for the murder of Jas. Fisk, Jr., shows that a pistol, presumed to belong to Fisk, was picked up on the stairs after the shooting.

The total loss of the Fifth Avenue Theatre is \$230,000 to \$300,000.

In New York City during the past year there were 140 suicides, 200 deaths by drowning, 57 homicides and 10 deaths by accidents.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 3.**—Troops organized against Apache Indians killed 37, captured a number and destroyed large quantities of provisions.

Flooding led at Wheeling, Madison and St. Louis caused additional losses to boats.

Evidence on both sides Stokes case finished, the argument for defence commenced.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 4.**—The English steamship *Sir Francis*, from Liverpool for Boston, went ashore on Hampton Beach, last night, during the prevailing fog. The vessel, which was loaded with passengers, was damaged and will be got off. The *Sir Francis* was of the Warren & Co's line.

The Texas, of the Dominion line, for Liverpool, left Boston last night, while entering Boston Bay. Her bow has been broken and stern off in twenty feet of water. She is being lightened of her cargo, and will be got off with slight damage.

**Boston, Jan. 6.**—Fires reported this morning—At South Boston, Conn., loss \$85,000; Emporia, Kansas, loss \$25,000; and at Orange, N. J., loss \$70,000.

The jury in the Stokes case returned a verdict on Saturday morning in the first degree. Sentence was deferred until to-day.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 7.**—A heavy fall of rain and sleet prevailed yesterday and last night, and the telegraph lines in all directions and flooding numerous cellars in city and suburbs.
