A steamer arrived at San Francisco last week from Hong Kong, with 1000 Chinese on board. During the week ending on the 3d inst., 22,718 cattle were received at the Chicago stock yards, the largest number ever received at any point in America during a similar period.

Wm. B. Astor is said to own three thousand head of cattle. The Colorado potato beetles have commenced their summer campaign in Indiana, and are eagerly awaiting the appearance of the coming crop.

A miser, seventy-three years old, and reported to be worth \$350,000, died in the Buffalo hospital a few days since. He had lived for thirty-seven years in a miserable hole, surrounded by filth and covered with vermin.

There will be one hundred millions of lumber run on the Kennebec this year over last year. So says the Fairfield Chronicle. The trip from New York to San Francisco is now made by \$73, first-class passage, than from New York to Liverpool.

The English Navy has just completed a new man-of-war ship called Decatur. It weighs over 10,000 tons, and is supplied with thirty-four engines, each possessing an indicated power of 6,000 horses.

The Grand Trunk Railway is to be completely renovated within the next two years. It is expected to be one of the best roads on the continent.

Montreal has contributed \$3000 to the sufferers by the coal mine explosion in N. S. Three German children were lately burned to death in a shanty in the township of Bourneau, County of Ottawa.

The Governor General, Lieut. Governors and Ministers of the Dominion are asked to become the guests of the city of Chicago during the approaching jubilee.

The Eastport Sentinel says that codfish have been caught in great numbers in that vicinity, and are the best that have ever been obtained within the recollection of old fishermen.

Thirty-two miles of logs are reported in Augus River, Michigan. The attack was practically ended on the 22nd, when the Hot Creek band, comprising about one-half of Captain Jack's followers, surrendered unconditionally to General Davis at Fairchild's Ranch.

The remainder of the Indians are still retreating, and the victorious pursuit is kept up. It is said to be probable that the prisoners will be treated as murderers and hanged.

The loss of life and property in Iowa by the tornado was much greater than was at first reported. Three persons died since morning, and the lives of many others are despaired of.

An enormous amount of property has been destroyed; only one house is left in the town of Lancaster. A fearful tornado passed north of Prairie City, Ill., on Tuesday evening, killing and wounding several persons and a large number of horses and cattle, blowing down houses, barns, etc.

The statements made that petitions are in circulation amongst the merchants of this city, for the removal of British goods, are without foundation. The previous statements reflecting personally upon the Consul are false and malicious, and emanated from irresponsible sources.

Flags are hoisted on the shipping in the harbor in honor of Queen Victoria's birthday, and a salute was fired at noon from various British steamers in the port.

The heaviest storm of wind, rain and hail known there for years occurred at Cairo, Ill., yesterday afternoon. The hail fell for thirty minutes and was discovered by the people.

The Carlists captured the town of Lanahija in Catalonia on Tuesday, and butchered sixteen men after the surrender of the town.

Several cases of cholera are reported in East Posen, Germany. HAVANA, May 22.—Mr. Price, New York Herald correspondent was arrested this morning by order of the Government, and placed in Fort Cabal. No one is allowed to communicate with him.

The London Lancet publishes a detailed statement of the malady of the Pope, which it says, is worse than has been officially stated. It is reported that a plot to kill President Thiers has been discovered. The concocter of the plot is said to be a madman.
