A WHOLE FAMILY POISONED.—About 11 o'clock last night a young man in a state of great excitement called at the office of Dr. T. J. O. Earle, on Union street, and requested his immediate attendance at a house at Pokiok above Indiantown, where the whole family had been poisoned. The Doctor posted off at once and on arrival found that a family named Burke, consisting of a father, two grown up sons, and a cousin, together with two hired men named Duncan McKenzie and Fields, were suffering extreme agony from violent colic, pains and vomiting, and showed other symptoms of lead

On enquiry he found that about ten days ago the family melted lead in a tea kettle to put in the journals of some mill machinery. The kettle has ever since been used for cooking purposes, and on examination Dr. Earle discovered a lump of lead still in it, which no doubt had so poisoned the water in use as to cause the symptoms which the people exhibited. He administered an antidote to the sufferers, and remained until nearly 2 o'clock this morning, at which time the symptoms were much more favorable. There appears no doubt that if medical assistance had not been secured, the whole family would have died from the effects of the lead poisoning, and even now one of them is not beyond danger.—News.
