NEW BRUNSWICK.—The *News* states that the new Hampton, (N. B.) bridge is now open to the public. The same paper reports the death of Mr. Charles Frost, of Lower Norton. He left his house Friday in search of a stray ox. Not returning search was made for him on Saturday, and he was found dead in the woods. He had his gun with him, and it is feared he committed suicide. He had been subject to fits of melancholy. . . . It is contemplated by the Common Council to organize a body of five policemen, composed of citizens who will serve without remuneration. . . . A gentleman in St. John, who has had experience in the business, has leased for five years, a piece of ground at Cape Brule, below the wharf, where he proposes to erect a quarry for grindstones, and also for building stones to be shipped to the United States. It will probably be operated by a company with a capital of \$2,000 or thereabouts. The opening of quarries in the Gulf is an additional argument for the immediate construction of the Bal Vene Canal. So says the *Telegraph*. . . . Measles prevail at Chatham, and several deaths have occurred. . . . George Bruce Ferguson, of Gagetown; Robert Barry Smith, of St. John; Joseph Hickson, of Dorchester; Frederick Herbert McKillop, of St. John; and William McKinnon, of L. A. B., were admitted and sworn in as members of the Supreme Court of the Province on the 23d inst., after having passed a satisfactory examination. . . . The *Globe* says, Diptheria has made its appearance in this city, and that several deaths have occurred. . . . Two men—John Walsh and Joseph Knight—living near the Suspension Bridge, got into a row on Monday. Knight threw stones at Walsh, then Walsh stabbed Knight, and then they both were arrested and lodged in the Portland Police Station. Knight's wound is thought to be serious. It is said they were both under the influence of rum. . . . The same paper also mentions the case of the same. . . . The *Telegraph* says, the St. John is lower than it has been for many years. . . . Hon. T. R. Jones's mill house near the Grand Falls Suspension Bridge was burned last week. Loss \$300. . . . A correspondent hints that the Carleton County Musical Convention was a great success as a musical display, reflecting the highest credit on the originator and manager, Mr. G. Snow, but that the attendance was not as large as it should have been, and as the character of the exhibition deserved. . . . Diptheria has made its appearance in several parts of the Province. It is said there is a number of cases in Fredericton and other parts of York Co. . . . Quinsy is dead; last Saturday, aged six months. . . . Attorney General King returned from England. . . . King's Co. sessions have voted to grant liquor licenses, and have fixed the rate at \$50 and \$80. \$500 was voted by the sessions towards the erection of a lock-up in Sussex. . . . W. H. Tuck, Esq., C. C., has been appointed Recorder of this city, in room of the late Hon. R. L. Hazen. . . . A number of the manufacturers in Waterloo and Union Streets have formed a society called the "Waterloo Union," the object of which is to protect their property from fire, there having been several fires in the vicinity recently, many of them supposed to have been the work of incendiaries. . . . A special to the *Times* from India says that Nana Sahib has been captured in Gwalior, has been identified beyond a doubt by the Maharajah of India, and is now a prisoner in the latter's palace.

NOVA SCOTIA.—The body of an unknown man was found in the woods near Halifax. . . . According to the *Halifax Citizen* a phantom ship, on the 23d inst., was seen by the people of Pictou, at the mouth of the harbor. . . . On Tuesday night, at Pictou, a schooner, 12 miles from Bridgewater, was seen, with three men, a cow, five sheep, and some farming utensils; supposed to have been caused by the loss of a lantern left burning in the building, amounting to \$500. . . . Mr. Vail, the newly appointed Minister of Militia, was elected the other day by Digby Co., by about 200 majority. . . . Two of the crew of the American fishing schooner C. W. G. were, on Gloucester, Mass., named Ned McFar-

en of Port Hastings, C. B., and Daniel Griffiths, of Shelburne, were drowned on the 18th of August last, while fishing. Both were unmarried
