New Brunswick.—On Thursday evening a firm way horse belonging to Mr. McCarthy, of the firm of Landry & McCarthy, King Street, knocked down and killed Miss Harriet Lee. She with her mother, and Mr. and Mrs. Thurgar, were standing talking at the corner of Duke and Charlotte streets when the sad occurrence took place. The young lady lived only a few minutes after being knocked down. Col. Thurgar and Mrs. Lee were knocked down also, and Mrs. Lee had two ribs broken. Horses should not be allowed to run so fast, and a knife and fork should be handed at Bathurst on Thursday last, the new sheriff, R. Vail, Esq., officiating. There were not many persons present.

Nearly every issue of the Gazette contains a batch of newly-appointed magistrates. For a change the Government might begin to issue lists of commissions cancelled. The magistracy would not suffer thereby.... Several of the mills in Portland, that have been closed for a short time are to commence running at once.... Moncton desires to be incorporated again.... In a drunken row, yesterday Friday, Those Spectacles, a knife and fork, nabbed Andrew McCastlin through the hand.... The Board of Education has appointed W. F. Dibblee, Esq., to be inspector of schools for Carleton Co., in place of J. H. Jacques, Esq., resigned.... The Soul has taken the place of the press between St. John, Digby and Annapolis. A black gown belonging to Rev. Dr. Ketchum, rector, was stolen from All Saints Church recently during the rector's absence. So says the Courier.... The Saint Stephen Board of School Trustees has been filled by the appointment of Hon. John Macdonald, M.P., as president, and Mr. C. E. Monagle, in place of those removed.... Indian hunters predict that winter will be on us and snow travel practicable by the 10th November. Perhaps so.... In the Rivere du Loup R.R., railways are being laid as far as the Bumfrah, only seventeen miles below Tobique.... The St. John County Court now sitting has had considerable criminal business. William Agnew, convicted of bigamy, was sentenced to two years in the Penitentiary. Samuel McCracken for the robbery of Gooden two years; and Addison (coloured) for smuggling, four years.... The late Mr. E. C. Martin, lad in the employ of Messrs. Francis & Co., of this city, attempted to jump from the Ferry Boat to the floats on the Carleton side. Some persons caught him as he jumped, evidently thinking he could not reach the floats. The result was that before he could, the boy's right leg was caught between the boat and the floats, and was terribly mashed. The leg was amputated that night, but the shock to his system was so great, that he died early next morning. (Tuesday).—A Montreal hotel keeper has offered \$120,000 for the Victoria Hotel, in this city.... J. T. Tully and M. McLean, 25 locomotives, 20 passenger coaches and 29 freight cars.... A correspondent of the Tribune writes that on the evening of the 28th ult., a daring robbery took place a few miles above Edmonston, Madawaska County. Between the hours ten and eleven o'clock, a man entered the house of Regis Martin, and took therefrom a trunk containing, among other things, \$850 in gold and 150 paper, besides promissory notes to the amount of \$200. Mr. Martin avows just as the thief was going out of the house with the trunk in his arm. He sprang up to bed, and ran after to find the thief, but calling out to him to stop, he then dropped the trunk, and struck Martin violent blow on the head, which laid him senseless on the ground. He then took the trunk and made off. No clue to his identity or to the missing money has been found. Mr. Martin is a respectable and well-to-do farmer.... The old bridge of Little Falls was burned to the ground the night of the 28th ult. The fire is supposed to have originated by a train.... The necessity of law abolishing imprisonment for debt, which was called in question, has been affirmed by the Supreme Court. This will release a great many persons from custody or from the limits. A whale is reported to have been seen in St. John harbour on Monday. The men who saw it say appeared to be about 25 feet long.... W. W. E. Lye, Esq., has been appointed by the Canadian Government Inspector of leather and raw hides. St. John, under the General Inspection Law the Dominion.

Jean Duhaime, a Frenchman, was described as follows: Height 5 feet 10 inches; complex...fair; eyes dark blue; hair light; he has a very peculiar expression of face, his lower lip hangs down, and the upper lip twisted to one side.
